

From the Conductor's Desk:

Tired of running the same old passenger train? Want to add a little variety to Saturday operations? Here are some ideas:

- The Club has a collection of DVD's featuring vintage films of late Norfolk & Western steam in operation during the mid-1950's. Much of the footage features run-bys of the Powhaton and several local passenger trains. These clips are an invaluable tool for more realistic passenger operations. They capture actual consists that can be readily duplicated with existing rolling stock on the layout. Try running a local with one baggage car, one combine, two coaches...
- Leave a baggage, RPO, dinner, or sleeper on the passenger siding in Johnson City to be picked up by the "name train" or conversely drop one of the cars off.
- Add express cars or reefers to the consist. This could coincide with seasonal traffic changes like produce harvests or additional holiday baggage and contract mail.
- Try staging a switcher on the passing sidings with the additional cut of cars for the passenger train. A "name train" crew seldom switched their own train.
- Run a mixed train... a combine or single coach with a string of freight cars would not be out of place.
- Running two trains on the same line adds to the variety. Plan for several meets. Have the freight or local passenger train
 go into the hole to allow the "name train" to overtake the freight and then back the freight back out onto the main
 line.

Class M 2-8-2 + Box Cars (x4) + Gondolas with fresh tie loads (x3) + Heavyweight Coach (x1) + Heavyweight RPO (x1)

"Pocahantas" (N & W No.15/16)

Class J + Smooth-side Baggage + Heavyweight Baggage + Heavyweight Combine + Smooth-side Coach (x3) + Observation

Class J + Heavyweight Baggage (x7) – Flute Sided Coach (RF&P) (x1) + Stainless Steel Flute Sided Coach (Southern) (x1) + Pullman (x2)

"Powhatan Arrow" (N & W No. 25/26)

Class J + Heavy Weight Baggage (x2) + Smooth-side Baggage (x1) + Smooth-side Combine (x1) + Smooth-side Coaches (x3) + Observation

Class J + RPO (x1) + Heavyweight Baggage (x1) + Smooth-side Coach (RF&P) (x1) + Combine (N&W) (x1)

Consists for some of the multi-road "name trains" could be quite varied with cars from all the participating lines present. The **"Pelican"** and the **"Tennessean"** are a couple of examples.

"Pelican" (circa 1957)

E8 A-A (Southern) + Baggage (x2) + RPO (x1) + Baggage (x1) + Box Car + Express Car (REA) + Baggage (x1) + Combine (x1) + Smooth-side Coach (x1) + Coach (x1) + Pullman (x1) + Dinner (x1) + Pullman (x1) + Observation. **NOTE:** Baggage cars were Heavyweight, Smooth-side and Harriman; coaches represented the participating roads; Pullmans were in Pullman colors and road markings. Norfolk & Western Coaches and Observation cars were Smooth-side.

If any members have public passenger timetables for their favorite roads, they can find notations detailing the make-up of many of the trains. Head end cars (baggage, express, and RPO) will not be noted but Pullman configurations, coaches and combines will be identified. Also identified are stations where dinning car service would be added and sections joined. Members may wish to share their collections or provide a clinic on their favorite passenger trains.



Road & Street Signs for the Layout:

Adding road and street signs is an evening project that adds a bit of detail binging life to your highways and by-ways. Everyone has

experience with signs on a daily basis. Street and highway signs help create a sense that people populate the layout. They suggest the routines and rules people have to follow in the course of going about their day-to-day activities.

Signs can also create a sense of time and place. In the mid-50's street and highway signs were not as standardized as they are today. Local variatiations can leave a lasting impression on a viewer when they say "Gee, I can remember a sign like that when I was growing up..."

What's Available:

There are plenty of ready-built, kit, and super-detailing products on the market which makes the process of adding signs along a highway, street or road an easy task. Just check the latest Walthers' catalogue for ideas. Here's a couple of suggestions.

The difficulty with relying on manufactured signs, however, is that you are limited to what the manufacturer has included in their set. What happens if you need more of one type of sign and not enough are provided – or – there is a style of sign not provided in the set? Another problem is with the scale of ready-built sets. Occasionally, the ready-built sets are too big and bulky to look good next to a fine-scale structure on the layout.

PRODUCT REVIEW

Dream-Plan-Build, Vol.7: Real Rails Edition - Big Power

- This is the latest edition of the Kalmbach Publishing Co.'s series of DVD's.
- Unlike the previous DVD's in the series, this volume's sole focus in on prototype railroading. Specifically, the video features modern diesel locomotives with HP ratings of 4,000 HP or more.
- Chapter selections emphasize the history of Big Power producers GE and EMD with shop scenes showing the construction of these high power units.
- For the modeler interested in modern locomotives the following units are featured:

GE Dash 9-44CW	EMD SD 70M
GE AC4400CW	EMD SD70MAC
GE AC6000CW	EMD SD90MAC

- This is a video with the TRAINS readership in mind.
- The DVD holds limited value for the modeler. Scenery and action shots are spectacular. Interior shots of the locomotive shops in Erie, PA (GE) and London, Ontario (EMD) provide details seldom seen but critical in accurate modeling.
