To complete our presentation on the Budd Rail Diesel Car let's look at some of the models produced and where the cars ran or are still running today.

First, the models:

KATO makes a set of Budd RDC's in N Scale. Models of RDC-1 (Coach with Control Cabs), RDC-2 (Baggage-Coach Combine), RDC-3 (Baggage-RPO-Coach Combine) and RDC-4 (RPO-Baggage Car). All are available through Walthers

and other venders for around \$80.00

MTH Electric Trains has produced O Gauge versions of the RDC-1 and RDC 2 under the RailKing label. Cost lists at \$299 for powered units with sound and \$99-149 for 2-car non-powered add-on sets. Availability is limited with Walthers lists the RDCs as unavailable but a number have shown up on Ebay.

Aristocraft makes both the RDC-1 and RDC-3 in G-Gauge. They are to be released sometime in the future and list at \$315.

K-Line made a series of RDC's for 3-rail 0

gauge, the most recognizable being a Blue B&O RDC-1. These are long out of production models though some appear on Ebay and can command several hundred dollars on auction.

Lionel produced a series of RDC-1, RDC-2, RDC-3 and RDC-4 models for 3-rail O-gauge tinplate. Again these are long out of production but can be found of Ebay on auction. Price can vary depending on the bidding.

Concor released a set of RDC's in N-scale. Like many of the models listed these are out of production.

Athearn made several releases of RDC in HO Scale. The earliest were made with extruded aluminum bodies and plastic ends. Later models were injection molded plastic shells and metal frames. All were powered by rubber band drives. While out of production they are generally available through Ebay and are inexpensive to purchase.

Several importers have produced RDC's in brass. These are rare and command starting priced in the range of \$150-175 on Ebay.

Kalmbach has produced yet another edition of videos in The Dream Plan Build video Series, this one entitled **RAILS ACROSS AMERICA**. The first issue, **Change in the Tehachepi's** is packed action shots of trains as they journey from Barstow to Bakersfield through the Mojave Sub in California.

The video is a bit slow and tedious, but adequately captures the action as BNSF, UP and other locomotive climb out of the Mojave into the Tehachepi Mountains. Chapters include:

From the Dispatcher's Desk – Fred's Thoughts....

We have 3 "Green Shirt Events" coming up that are very important for the club. They are all official events connected to the university and it is critical that we have as many participants as possible to operate the layouts and to interact with our visitors. Two of them are scheduled for mornings during the workweek. That means that some of our members will be at their regular jobs and probably will not be able to participate and that will make it even more important that those who don't have a scheduling conflict be there to represent the club. It also means that university classes will be in session and parking places will be at a premium and probably nonexistent. My recommendation is for you to stop by Safety and Security just off University Parkway and get a visitor parking sticker for the day. Then park on the blocked off street in front (east side) of the building housing the museum. You have to enter from the north (mini-dome side off State of Franklin) and drive through the section with the cable barrier (barrier is usually down) and park near the building on either side of the street. I will contact the campus police and tell them what is happening and ask them not to ticket your vehicle. If you get a ticket give it to me and I will try to "fix" it. The Sat. 20th event should not require any special parking action and there should be places in the parking lot on the west side of the building where we normally park when we are working at the museum. Our public phase of our work is just beginning, but most of it will be having the museum open on Saturdays from 10 a.m. to 3:00 p.m. for the public. We will need to start doing this very soon.

The September Cookout by the Lake hosted by Kim and Tom McKee at their beautiful lakeside home was a well attended, wonderful event. We had more than 20 members, spouses and significant-others in attendance and the McKees were exceptional hosts. Tom's garden railroads are terrific and we were all thrilled to watch the big G-gauge locos with their consists snake their way over curved trestles, around water elements, under tunnels and through the woodlands. The combined food dishes and the grilled meats were a taste treat and everyone had full tummies and a great time. We have not had a picnic as a club for many years and from all the comments I have heard we need to plan on having at least one each year. We want to express our deepest appreciation to the McKee's for making it possible.

Museum update: Additional ceiling lights and track lighting have been installed by the university and the new metal doors are up and painted. Four large glass sided cases with top lighting, glass shelves and lockable doors are now in place and the displays are going inside. One case near the entrance will be devoted to George L. Carter and the Clinchfield Railroad and already has some great display items in it. The university has ordered security cameras to be installed in the museum room for added security of it contents. Through some contacts Hobie Hyder made NSRR donated a flashing crossbuck signal with mast and base that will soon be installed outside the museum and electrified to be used to attract visitors when the museum is open. Additionally, wall overhead cabinets and a bookcase have also been installed in our workroom and already much of the clutter on the worktops of the base cabinets has been stored inside them. Harriet Swank has sewn more skirts for the N-scale layout and by the time you read this will have some for the G-scale layout as well. Duane has been busy installing the clothes pins to attach the skirts with. The changes are noticeable and the museum is really beginning to look like a railroad museum, but it has been accomplished only by dedicated work and long hours of volunteered time. Everyone should be proud of what you have accomplished and I am sure you all can see the potential we have for making this a very special place that will attract and educate lots of people in the coming months and years. Thank you all for all you have done. But, there is much yet left to do. The modules on the mountain side nearest the door are now front-and-center as the first part of the club layout visitors see. They are also the modules that need the most work to bring them up to that morefinished look that most of the rest of the layout now has. We need you as the owner of one or more of these modules to devote some time on a regular basis for the rest of 2007 to do just that. If you need help there are members of the club ready and willing to assist you, but this has to be done and quickly.


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

Our club will also be centrally focused, both in the dedication remarks as the people whose work made the exhibits possible and as the experts who make the trains run smoothly through the miniature landscapes we have created. I am responsible for creating some of the guest list for official university invitations to the event and also will be asked to contact potential speakers for the morning lectures. If any of you have suggestions for either list please let me know as soon as you can after you read this as time is short. So, mark you calendars for all that will be happing in October and November at the new railroad museum and come be a part of the history we are making.


