





Meeting brought to order by Pres. Fred Alsop at 7:00 p.m. with 23 members present. New members, Stephen and Christy Brown, attended the meeting and all members present

introduced themselves

Fred passed around a proposed lay-out of the HO scale train yard for the museum.

Officer Reports

Secretary: Since Secretary Art Daniels was not present, Harriet Swank volunteered to take notes. Jim Pahris made a motion to accept the minutes of the October meeting as published in the November Signal Bridge; Paul Haynes seconded the motion and it passed unanimously.

Newsletter Editor: Ted Bleck-Doran is asking for news articles for the Signal Bridge.

Treasurer: The Treasurers Report was read by Duane Swank.

Balance Forwarded \$1,598.48 Income \$ 829.64 \$ 543.40 Expenses Mo. End Balance \$1,884.72 Available Balance \$1,505.72

Fred reminded all members that the 2010 renewal membership dues are now payable at any time.

Webmaster: John Edwards, reported that the web site is up and operating with a members only section.

Vice President: John Carter, is looking for programs for upcoming meetings.

Dec. program will be the annual Christmas Party Jan. program will be given by Gary Emmert Feb. program may possibly be given by Ted Bleck-Doran.

This one is still undecided.

President: Ilene Street donated 93 train related videos to the club. Fred was given a complete list of these videos as inventoried by Duane Swank. Ted Bleck-Doran made a motion to place these in locked display cases in the Rabetov room and be signed out to members by an officer of the Club with a \$30.00 or more penalty (the value of the video) for each video signed out if it is not returned. This would be to obtain a replacement copy. John Edwards seconded this motion. After discussion, Jim Pahris made an amendment, seconded by Lyle Montieth, to hold until January the procedure to handle sign in and out of these videos. This was unanimously passed.

Old Business:

- 2nd Anniversary: Fred thanked everyone for all the hard work in getting the new kids room ready for the ETSU Homecoming Celebration on Saturday and all those who worked the rooms to make OUR 2nd anniversary at the museum a success.
- Logo Contest: The MEMRR Logo Contest ended on Friday, 11/14/09. There were 15 entries and a few more may come in that could have been postmarked on or before 11/14/09 but did not make it to the college address as yet. Judges will be selected to choose a winner.

- 3. NCE Equipment Sale: The NCE discussed last month that the Club has for sale is being sold off in pieces. Joe Roberts has purchased some of it and Don Ramey is interested in some of what is left. There is a man from N.C. who has been in touch with Fred and may want to purchase some of whatever may be left after Club members have gotten what they want. The balance of the NCE will be open for anyone after January 1, 2010, as agreed to in last month's meeting.
- Clarification of ownership: Joe Roberts brought up the question of who owns the face plates of the NCE. John Edwards explained that the new DCC face plates were all purchased with Club money and therefore would be a tradeoff for the NCE plates which were purchased by individual modular owners therefore making the NCE Club property to be sold.
- Graybeal Acquisitions: Jim Pahris reported on the purchase of Along the ET & WNC from Johnny Graybeal. Of the 7 volume set, volumes 3 and 7 cannot be found but the other 5 have been ordered at \$17.00 each. Tarheel Press is shipping instock items only. They are not publishing any items at present due to the economy.
- Tweetsie Volumes: The purchase of books The Blue Ridge Stemwinder and Tweetsie Country for the Club as a reference library for the Ken Marsh Room and Tweetsie lay-out were discussed. There is a possibility that Geoff Stunkard may donate The Blue Ridge Stemwinder but if not, Gary Rabetoy made a motion to purchase it for \$50 + \$5 S/H and the Tweetsie Country for \$42.95 + S/H. The motion was seconded by Jim Pahris and passed unanimously.
- 7. Roundhouse Stall Board: Allan Morton has completed the round house stall board but is having some problem locating a spot to hang it.
- Kids Activity Room: Fred will make out a check list for the Kids Room of what needs to be done in there to be operational each Saturday as well as the switches to turn ON & Off. Also, Fred noted that the DVD & TV in the main exhibit room were left on one day after everyone had gone and locked up. Be sure to double check everything to assure nothing is left on.
- Tweetsie Equipment: Old Fort Train Shop has 4 narrow gauge brass Tweetsie locomotives for sale at \$699 each; whereas John Carter found some for \$575 each. These would be a great representation of the Tweetsie R.R. which is being planned for the Rabetoy lay-out. Fred would like to buy 4 of these locos, about \$2300, using college funds, outside donors money, etc., and not use the Club's money. Jim Pahris suggested Fred go ahead with the purchase of the locos, but Fred decided to wait for a little more money to be available.
- 10. Rabetoy Donation: Gary Rabetoy made a motion to donate to the museum all the unfinished benchwork frames in the Rabetoy room to be finished off with funds by the college. However, if an individual would want to purchase items for the modules and donate them to the museum that could be done as a donation to the museum. This was seconded by Jim Pahris and passed unanimously.

11. Election of Officers: Nominations for 2010 officers were presented by the nominating committee (Harriet Swank and Allan Morton) as follows:

(the secretary's position was difficult to fill and was a last minute nomination made by Joe Roberts). The members present voted on the nominees and all were voted in unanimously.

New Business

- December Meeting: The December Christmas Party was discussed. John Carter will head the committee and contact Penny McLaughlin at Tipton-Haynes about holding the dinner there either the 15th or 17th of December if the facility is available. The committee will consist of: Jim Pahris. Charlene McLeod, Lois Woods, Mary Doran-Bleck, and Harriet Swank. Bill Hensley volunteered to donate a cooked turkey. Harriet & Duane Swank will furnish pulled pork. The menu will be discussed by the committee and members will be contacted about what they will furnish. It was suggested that Dirty Santa be played again this year with a gift exchange of \$15 to \$20 value and having a train related theme.
- Holiday Decorations: Christmas Decorations for the museum. Duane Swank reminded the group that he had donated a tree last year and it is being stored in his basement. It will be brought to the museum for display. Anyone wishing to help with decorations, donating items and/or helping to put them up are welcome.

MOUNTAIN EMPIRE MODEL RAILROADERS Operating Group Coordinators Meeting -November 12, 2009

To: Fred Alsop III, President, Mountain Empire Model RailRoaders (MEMRR)

From: Gary Rabetoy, Coordinator, Rabetoy Layout Development Operating Group

Rabetoy Layout Development: **Progress Report:**

1. A. On October 18, 2009, Gary Cameron, Rich Gallaher, and I participated in an excursion to the Doe River Gorge which followed the ET&WNC RR route from the Doe River Ministries, Inc. (which conducted the excursion) at Hampton, Tennessee, to Pardee Point. I took multiple photographs to document the details of this trip including photos of the two tunnels along the route for later scenic reference.

- 2. At the MEMRR general meeting on October 20, 2009, members voted to obtain all volumes of Along the ET&WNC by Johnny Graybeal. Volumes 1, 2, 4, 5, and 6 were reported to be in stock and available at the author's discount price of \$17.00. Volume 3 (Along the ET&WNC Volume III: Depots) of the latter publication series and The Railroads of Johnson City were apparently not in stock and will be acquired, if possible, in the open market at the current market price but not to exceed \$75.00. I believe that purchase of a copy of neither The Blue Ridge Stemwinder book by John Waite and Chris Ford nor the book Tweetsie Country by Mallory Hope Ferrell were authorized or discussed at the meeting according to the minutes published in The Signal Bridge, Volume 16, Number 11 (November 2009 Issue).
- Similarly, members voted to approve the MEMRR club joining the ET&WNC RR Historical Society at a cost of \$20.00 per year.
- **4.** It is my understanding that Jim Pahris was given the responsibility to accomplish items B and C above.
- 5. The CD entitled 20 Years (1988-2007) of "The Stemwinder" became available on November 6, 2009 at a price of \$42.50 per disk including shipping and handling. This is a collection of all 62 issues of The Stemwinder publication which reportedly contains a wealth of historical information on the ET&WNC RR including photos, maps, scale drawings of equipment and structures, reproductions of historical railroad documents, and stories about that railroad. I have purchased a copy of this CD which I will donate to the MEMRR club to supplement the reference library being assembled. Information with a link to the website for ordering this CD is included with this report.
- **6.** Another CD which will document via aerial photographs the ET&WNC RR route is also planned (link enclosed).
- 7. On November 6, 2009, I discussed with Chris Ford (telephone number (901) 529-2345) what he considered to be the optimal period of operation and for modeling the ET&WNC RR. He advised me that it was his opinion that the period from 1920-1925 (possibly extending to 1930) was the best period. Ten wheeler locomotives were in use and the iron ore, lumber, and passenger business were all active. Apparently John Waite has also written editorials to the effect in "The Stemwinder" publication reproduced on the above CD.
- 8. Also on November 6, 2009, I called John Waite (telephone number (573) 659-9192) to inquire about the most optimal period as noted above and to obtain plans (if available) for the Elk Park Sawmill and the Valley Forge Coal Chute. As he was unavailable, I left a message for him to return my call. John Waite is having a model of the Johnson City Furnace

constructed by a professional model maker for his own layout featuring the ET&WNC RR. It is anticipated that there will be a future series of articles in Railroad Model Craftsman which will detail the construction of this model and will include plans.

- On November 6, 2009, I joined the Yahoo! Groups Tweetsie Group (link enclosed) which reportedly is also an excellent source of information on the ET&WNC RR.
- **10.** It is my recommendation that:
 - a. A copy of The Blue Ridge Stemwinder book by John Waite and Chris Ford and a copy of the book Tweetsie Country by Mallory Hope Ferrell should be authorized for purchase for the ET&WNC RR reference library.
 - The period 1920-1930 should be considered as the period to be modeled.
 - c. When the reference library is complete (anticipated possibly by the next regular meeting of this group on December 10, 2009), I plan to request volunteers to commence work on a track plan.
- **11.** Items related to the ET&WNC RR that are available from Cranberry Car Shops



Carter Railroad Museum celebrates second
anniversary

The George L. Carter Railroad Museum at ETSU celebrated its second anniversary Saturday, Nov. 14, in conjunction with ETSU Homecoming and National Model Railroad Month.

Dedicated in November 2007, the Carter Railroad Museum was named in memory of George L. Carter, the entrepreneur and philanthropist who donated 120 acres and \$100,000 to the state of Tennessee for the establishment in 1911 of a normal school, or teacher's college, which eventually became ETSU.

Over the last two years, many visitors have enjoyed the museum's large, intricate, operating model train layouts of towns and scenery, as well as its railroad-related items of historical significance.

A full-sized flashing railroad crossing signal donated by Norfolk Southern Railroad Group stands outside the museum's entrance on the west side (ground level) of the Campus Center Building, and its red lights blink when the museum is open on Saturdays from 10 a.m.-3 p.m., staffed by Mountain Empire Model Railroaders Club (MEMRR) volunteers.

Since its inception, museum volunteers have continued to add new exhibits and upgrade existing ones. Some significant changes include the establishment of three large operating layouts in different scales, which provides better viewing accessibility for visitors.

The Little Engineer's Room, which officially opened as part of the anniversary celebration, is a brightly painted, child-friendly room. Since the museum's other operating layouts are considered "hands-off," the room gives kids an opportunity to play as they learn. The room features a caboose and a large-screen television showing "Thomas-the-Tank" and other children's railroad programs, as well as a large-scale train donated by Dollywood that circles the ceiling and a "Thomas-the-Tank" railroad play station contributed by Johnson City's Hobbytown USA.

These children, along with Hobie Hyder of the Mountain Empire Model Railroaders Club, enjoy the Thomas-the-Tank play station in the Carter Railroad Museum's new Little Engineer's Room.
