

It has been donated to the RR Museum through the university and will be put in storage for several months with the hopes that we can find a home for it with the proceeds from the sale going into the RR Museum's foundation account for use in the museum (the Tweetsie project will still need dollars to bring it to completion and selling this layout will be a big boost in that venue). This is the layout that we have been discussing in the newsletter and at club meetings for some time now. We have two special events coming up that I need for you to put on your calendars because I need a few volunteers to come in and have the Carter Railroad Museum open for them during a couple of weekdays. Both openings are connected with special events at the university and they are a very small part of the 'rent' we pay to have the railroad museum. Event #1: For the 4th consecutive year we are being asked to participate in the President's Classroom. Railroading in the Days Before Radio Submitted by Gary Emmert



The lanterns we had before these just had a plain aluminum tubing handle on them. When giving a signal for a long period of time, the older lanterns tended to "drift" through your fingers, and you were always trying to re-position the dern thing for a better grip. Some guys wrapped friction tape around the bail (handle,) but all that did was make a complete mess of things, and then they wouldn't slide on your jacket sleeve when you were climbing up the side or end of a car.

These lanterns with the yellow rubber handle were ugly, but they eliminated the "drift" problem. I think they came out sometime around 1966 or 1967.

Mine was wrecked one night on a 3rd trick job. We were kicking cars uphill at Roanoke, on a very cold Winter night. I was hanging on the side of a box car, holding the cut lever up with my foot. We had hold of probably 35 cars and were switching with two big 6axle Alcos. I waved down the engineer and nothing happened, ... he just kept coming hard. I glanced back and discovered that I had lost sight of the engine due to a slight curve in the track. Only thing I knew to do was fling my lantern sideways and high up into the air, out into the engineman's field of view. This I did, giving it some "English," so that it did a cartwheel through the air. He saw it and put the brake into emergency. We stopped before we hit anything, but those 15 or so cars I cut off made a terrible crash when they impacted cars already standing in the track. I'll bet it knocked a couple of them off center... but that was for the car inspectors to find. When I went to retrieve my lantern, I found that it had come down hard on the ball of a rail, and the rail had put a HUGE, deep dent in the side of the case, the battery had split open, and the lantern was no longer usable. Next lantern I got was not as good as the ugly yellow handle one.

And you know what? I'll take in a heartbeat railroading back in those days, over the garbage that passes for "railroading" today...

RAILROAD HERITAGE DAY September 24

Big-time Western Railroading Comes to East Tennessee ETSU's George L Carter Railroad Museum will Feature:

'How the West Was Won – Railroading West of the Misssissippi'

This year's very popular Railroad Heritage Days at the George L Carter Railroad Museum in ETSU's Campus Center building will continue on the last Saturday of the month (September 24), showcasing western railroads. Working in collaboration with The Mountain Empire Model Railroaders and the Carter Chapter of the National Railway Historical Society, the museum will host a special program of events for this day.

The museum's layouts, in HO, N, and G scales, will have equipment from railroads like the Union Pacific, Southern Pacific, Santa Fe and others, while the display cases at the multi-room facility will feature rare artifacts from the past, including narrow gauge operations in Colorado, a rare Lionel Super Chief set from 1959, and native American promotional items from several lines. Videos featuring western railroading action will also be shown.

"The legacy of railroading across vast expanses of the western United States tied our nation together following the divisiveness of the Civil War," says Geoff Stunkard, the museum's Heritage Days coordinator. "Access to the pacific coast resulted in major engineering works that created not just physical challenges but opportunities for America, whose population rapidly expanded westward as a direct result. We are very pleased to have a day honoring that effort."

Beyond the well-remembered 1869 'golden spike' ceremony at Promontory Point, Utah completing the first transcontinental line that ended in the Bay Region of California, others took a more southerly route to Los Angeles and San Diego, and several more connected across the northern tier into Washington and Oregon.

Every single passage required a Herculean effort to cross the Rockies and associated mountain ranges, resulting in some of the most dramatic railroad mileage in the world.



The 2011 Railroad Heritage Days were initiated because the University is celebrating 100 years since being founded with the generous support of George L. Carter, who was a railroad and mining magnate at the turn of the century. Due to their popularity, plans for the Heritage Days to continue into 2012 are now being finalized and will be released soon. The Carter Railroad Museum is open on Saturdays from 10:00 AM to 3:00 PM, and includes the aforementioned layouts, a special child's activity room, and ongoing programs. There is no admission fee but donations are welcome for its upkeep. The museum is also seeking artifacts for the newest addition, a 1300-sq. foot room dedicated to the longdefunct, but well-remembered, East Tennessee & Western North Carolina Railroad, the 'Tweetsie' narrow gauge, which is now under construction. In addition to the displays, there is also a growing research library, a National Railway Historical Society chapter, membership docent opportunities, and an oral history archive being established as part of the museum's programs. CARTER RAILROAD MUSEUM 'RAILROAD HERITAGE DAYS' WILL CONTINUE FOR 2012

Highly popular program will encompass different subject, more coverage, and new exhibits

The George L. Railroad Museum on the campus of East Tennessee State University, in conjunction with the Mountain Empire Model Railroaders (MEMRR) and the George L Carter Chapter NRHS, will continue the monthly Heritage Days into the 2012 year. Originally intended for the university's 2011-based 100th anniversary, the popularity of the events among the public and museum members has confirmed these programs will not end with the Railroad Museum's final event for 2011 in December. Once again in 2012, one Saturday of each month will be set aside as a special tribute day to specific American railroads and regions.

On each special day, club members are committing to bring specific models for operation on the extensive 20' x 44' HO railroad, which is made up of modular sections that were detailed by their sponsoring owners and scaled to a 1.87:1 standard. Members are now bringing equipment for the extensive N-scale line as well.

"We were very happy with both the participation and the public's response to the 2011 program," says Geoff Stunkard, an MEMRR member who is coordinating these special events. "There are a huge number of people who recall and appreciate the heritage the museum has offered, so we are very excited to be able to bring these programs to life for another season and beyond."

While the overall program is still being developed, two events will remain in place for 2012 - the Steam UP All-Steam Train Day in

March, and the **Clinchfield Railroad Day** in October. Tentatively, events for the Southern and Norfolk & Western lines will also continue. A schedule will be released shortly.
