

GEORGE L. CARTER RAILROAD MUSEUM CELEBRATES 4th Anniversary In November

November is National Model Railroad Month and Friday, November 18th is National Take-a-Toy-Train-to-Work Day. The George L. Carter Railroad Museum at East Tennessee State University will celebrate its 4th Anniversary with a series of special events that will continue into the Christmas Holiday Season. The museum is a memorial to George L. Carter, founder, builder and owner of the Clinchfield Railroad and houses historic photos of Mr. Carter and the building of the Clinchfield as well as displays of Clinchfield Johnson City has a rich railroad history as an important rail stop Railroad historic memorabilia. Carter provided the land to the state of Tennessee that ETSU was founded on as well as other financial enticements that persuaded the Governor of Tennessee and his educational board to establish East Tennessee Normal School here in 1911.

for the Southern Railroad, the Clinchfield Railroad, and as the railhead for the East Tennessee & Western North Carolina "Tweetsie" Railroad. Many of the model locomotives and their consists that operate on the museum's working model railroad layouts accurately depict these vanished railroads. Operating alongside these miniature railroads is the only operating "ETSU Express" with its string of heavyweight blue and gray coaches pulled by a Berkshire 2-8-4 steam locomotive.

Model railroad clinics and demonstrations have become a November tradition at the Carter Railroad Museum and members of the Mountain Empire Model Railroaders have presented free clinics and workshops on track laying, scenery, tree making, water elements, weathering buildings and rollingstock, and many other elements of the hobby of model railroading as discrete, individual programs in the past. This year for our museum anniversary we will roll all the mini-clinics into one continuous demonstration event every Saturday from November 19th to December 10th with the construction of a big 18" x 72" module that will begin with the basics of benchwork construction and continue in steps to the completed, fully-sceniced module. All aspects of the hobby of model railroading will be covered from approximately 10 a.m. to 3:00 p.m. each Saturday. The public is invited to come and join us and see how model railroad layout work is done and follow our progress from start to finish. Our teachers will show you how and answer your questions as the module is built step-by-step.

The 2011 Railroad Heritage Days were initiated because the University is celebrating 100 years since being founded with the generous support of Carter, a major railroad and mining magnate

at the turn of the century. Due to their popularity, plans for the Heritage Days to continue into 2012 are now finalized and these popular Carter Railroad Museum events will feature something old, something new, and a few surprises monthly through next year. The railroad to be showcased on November 26th will be the Norfolk and Western, "Nights and Weekends-Long Trains on the N&W". The Carter Railroad Museum is open on Saturdays from 10:00 AM to 3:00 PM, and includes the aforementioned layouts, a special child's activity room, and ongoing programs. There is no admission fee but donations are welcome for its upkeep. The museum is also seeking artifacts for the newest addition, a 1300-sq. foot room dedicated to the long-defunct, but well-remembered, East Tennessee & Western North Carolina Railroad, the 'Tweetsie' narrow gauge, which is now under construction. In addition to the displays, there is also a growing research library, a National Historical Society chapter, membership docent Railway opportunities, and an oral history archive being established as part of the museum's programs. December. Both organizations will be on a regular meeting schedule again in January 2012.




IN THE LIBRARY C&IM Special Return of the Heavyweights

Added to the Club video library is a copy of the National Railway Historical Society's Living Archives Series Volume 1 – C&IM Special. The video records a return of a passenger train to the Chicago & Illinois Midland rails. It covers the C&IM mainline in Illinois and the Sangamon River valley including a stop at the Havana rotary dumper complex.

Green C&IM diesels of the modern C&IM are shown along with rare color footage of steam in action. Selections of video and film views were gathered from members of the Chicago & Illinois Midland Chapter – NRHS. This is an interesting look at a road that saw heavy steam and 1st generation diesels working side by side.

Reserve your viewing by checking this video out of the library. Grab the easy chair, pop the video in the player and kick your feet up for a 28 minute ride through the American heartland. A great evening's viewing on a cold winter's night.

LITTLE DETAILS: STUMPS Making And Adding Small Castings Can Bring A Scene To Life By Ted "The Terrible" Bleck- Doran



Little things can make a big difference when they are added to a trackside scene on the layout. One small detail can be a strategically placed stump in a residential street – or – a cluster of stumps in the edge of a field or along a hedgerow – or – how about an area that's been timbered off and all that's left is a clear cut area filled with tops, debris, and stumps. Imagine the backstory of the scene: a storm has taken that proud old oak down in the front lawn; Farmer McDonald wants to clear a few more acres and has brought out the tractor to pull stumps; or the lumber company has finished timbering off a tree lot and has moved on.

The Muskrat Mountain Mining and Timber Company recently faced one of the above scenarios. It needed a bunch of stumps in a hurry. Cruising eBay I came across a set of Fine Scale Miniatures cast metal stumps. They were obtained at a reasonable price but... As with FSM products they were the only ones available and the set provided just 24 castings. That's hardly enough to depict a suburban wood lot much less an old growth forest!



Solution: Drop by Michael's or Hobby Lobby and purchase a can of Latex. I used rubber cement to affix the casting to a sheet of styrene. Then I liberally applied 3 or 4 coats of latex making sure to work the latex into the cracks and crevices, On the $4^{\rm th}$ coat I worked a layer of surgical gauze into the latex while it was still wet.

The latex and gauze layer was followed by 2 or 3 more layers of latex solution. The latex impregnated gauze layers make to molds more durable and less prone to tearing from repeated use.

Having a spouse who works in dentistry helps but asking a dentist also works in finding a supply of dental stone. This is a durable substance that mixes like plaster and dries to a rock-like hardness, excellent for castings. Mix a small batch of dental stone powder with water to a thick soupy consistency. Pour it into the mold and VOLLA' – you have a batch of stumps ready to plant on the layout.

Well almost ready... now the fun begins. It's time to paint.



I used water based acrylics in only three colors. I like the craft style acrylics because they are cheap, readily available, work well either straight from the bottle, as a wash, or with a dry brush technique, and did I say – cheap? The three colors were Yellow Ochre, Burnt Umber and a Medium or Dark Grey.



Pictured above is a cluster of stumps with a coat of Yellow Ochre to depict the heart of the tree stump. I paint only the cut face of the stump though one could give the entire stump a coat of yellow.

Next a coat of brown (umber) is applied to define the exterior bark of the stump. One does not have to strive for perfection – a little of the brown can "bleed" into the yellow. Wood colors can vary widely from tree to tree in nature.



The final stage is to apply a wash of medium or dark grey. Why grey? You thought tree back was brown in nature... nope... tree back is varying shades of grey, brown, black and even green. The wash of grey weathers the stump blurring the sharp contrast of the yellow and dark brown.



A rule of thumb to follow: the older the stump the more grey and darker it appears. So don't work if a stump or two get too much grey wash over the yellow heart wood



This project took the following time:

- Mold making: 0.5 hrs affixing the stumps to a backing sheet
 0.5 hrs applying the latex mold agent per coat
- Pouring the molds: 0.5 hrs mixing/pouring the dental stone
- Painting the stumps: hum... I did 150 over 2 nights while watching TV – it doesn't require a lot of attention.

The final result – well – you be the judge...

Mountain Empire Model Railroaders COORDINATORS' MEETING, 10 NOVEMBER 2011

The Coordinators' Meeting was called to order by President Fred Alsop at 6:00 in room 235 Campus Center Building, ETSU. Reports of the Coordinators present follow:

Bad Order Cars—Jim Holt. The club now has 149 freight cars and 28 passenger cars in good order and ready to run. Materials needed: 33" metal wheel sets = 4 packs; car weights (Tod Eaton will furnish this), and weights for open hoppers. HOn3 stock inventory: 4 ET&WNC RR 4-6-0 locomotives, 1 piggyback custom built flat car w/trailer, 1 assembled flat car (thanks Rich Gallaher), 33 HOn3 kits (Ted Bleck-Doran has 5 hopper kits, Rich Gallaher has 1 coach and 1 flat car kit, Bob Jones has 1 coach).

Library Report—Gary Emmert. Bob Jones has all the books in the glass case catalogued. Dave Doughty has 85% of the magazines in storage boxes and tagged.

Cope Mobile Layout—Gary Emmert. Dave Doughty and Gary Emmert will do a carnival scene after January 1st. Jim Pahris will check on Bachman and Thomas-the-Tank buildings for the layout. The layout needs leg extensions designed for it so it may be raised to be more easily observed by standing adults. We need to replace 3-4 Atlas switch machine motors and a possible short in the trackage needs to be traced and eliminated.

Sales—Duane Swank. Status quo on patches, hats, etc. with no need to stock additional items at this time. Jim Pahris will check with HobbytownUSA for battery-powered Christmas Trains for sale as we did last year.

Displays—Jim Pahris. We will be featuring the N&W Railroad for the Heritage Day Event on 26 Nov. Display materials are solicited from the members and the items will be changed out in the display cases on Thursday night, 17 Nov.

Special Events—Jim Pahris. Saturday, 21 January, 2012 the Carter Chapter NRHS and the Carter RR Museum with help from the MEMRR will conduct the first 2 sessions for the <u>Boy Scouts of America railroading merit badge</u>. Fred will make arrangements for a room to be used for the day and there will be a limit of 25 boys and their leaders per session.

N-Scale Layout Give-A-Way. Allan Morton and some of the other MEMRR members will take the previously donated N-Scale 'snow scene' layout and rebuild it into a refurbished winter scene layout that will be given away via a drawing on 20 December. Anyone may register for the drawing by filling out a registration card and making a donation of any amount. Bob Barrett of HobbytownUSA will donate an N-Scale locomotive, several pieces of rollingstock, and a small power pack to this project.

Annual Holiday Party. Jim Pahris will contact Tipton-Haynes Historic Site to reserve a room for our annual holiday party with Tuesday, 20 December (our regularly scheduled meeting date for Dec.) being the preferred date. We will need more party supplies and Jim Pahris will coordinate the party.

N-Scale Layout—Tod Eaton. The N-Scalers continue to improve the operation of the layout by cleaning track and working on bad-order rolling stock.

Special Events/Publicity-Hobie Hyder. Absent, no report.

Newsletter—Ted Bleck-Doran. The November issue will be a large one with 14 pages. Editor needs copy, ideas, themes, photos, etc.

Little Engineer's Room—Dave Doughty. Need to restock kid's book shelves. See if we can get Booklover's Warehouse to make another donation.

President's Report-Fred Alsop.

- 1) The new Carter RR Museum trailer now has Museum Logo and ETSU decals attached by Creative Signs and it looks sharp! Needs to be inspected by some of our 'trailer' guys to see if we need to do any minor repairs and for a recommendation for locks for the doors. Anyone want to help with this minor detail? Please see Fred
- 2) The RR Museum has been given a new room to be used for storage upstairs. Room 236 will have 2 keys, Fred will have one and Gary Emmert will have the other. Shelving will be obtained from ETSU and we will move a lot of the things now taking up valuable work space out of room 108 and upstairs into it. Bring some moving dollys on Thursday night and we will begin moving things.
- 3) The ETSU Centennial locomotives, tenders and display cases will be competed in a few day with special volunteer work sessions beginning on Sunday afternoon. The completed work on the 55 units to be decaled and cases completed will earn the museum's foundation account \$1,200 and those funds will go back into the Tweetsie RR HOn3 project now underway.
- 4) The club decided to do a continuous clinic over several Saturdays that will use an 18" x 72" base that will be completed in several steps to demonstrate how an HO-Gauge layout is constructed. Fred will design a schematic for the layout and Gary Emmert will put together the benchwork. Other volunteers are needed each Saturday in November and the first 3 Saturdays of Dec. to demonstrate various modeling/scenery techniques to the public on this 'continuous clinic module'. Please contact Fred to volunteer to do part of this clinic.

T-SCALE By: James Gregg

If you are all thumbs, the smallest production model train in the world (so claimed), maybe shouldn't be your next project. This micro-size train operates on steel rails with ABS ties and roadbed. The wheels are magnetic which helps it to stay on the track especially at high speeds. It is claimed that the little train will run inverted although I haven't confirmed this but plan to give it a try soon.



It all started when a gentleman named Hirotsuga Hirai wished he could build a train that would run on top of his laptop computer. He sketched it out and determined the scale had to be 3mm (0.118 in). The "t" stands for "three," which is the track gauge in millimeters.

The t- scale 1/450 was introduced by Eishindo at the Tokyo, Japan toy show in 2006 and released for sale in 2008. They are available in other parts of the world and from the *U.S. firms listed below. Only scale Japanese trains are manufactured by Eishindo at this time along with track, buildings, trees, other accessories, and yes, people. According to the National Center for Health Statistics, the average height of a male in the United States is 69.2 inches tall. This puts the height of a t-scale man to 0.154 inches tall. Eishindo is planning to expand their production lines in the future to include trains from other parts of the world.

The cost of a starter set runs around \$175.00 which includes two motorized cars and two unpowered set up for a push-pull configuration. Most important is the rerailer for big unsteady hands and the power unit that operates on 3 AA batteries or by power adapter from 110V.

Although I consider myself new at this model railroad business, I have owned a HO train for about forty years and started building a (Marklin) Z-scale layout about 15 years ago. It sat dormant until I retired a while back, and now I have the fever again. I have a lot of questions about railroad building which led me to the ETSU museum. I was so impressed with what I saw I wanted to be a part of it. So I am now a new member hoping I can learn and in some way help along the way. My first Thursday work night was to help Gary get the new storage room in order. My first Saturday work day was helping Fred dig post holes. This railroading is tougher than I thought.







JAPAN UNVEILS THE NEW SPEED CHAMP Taking High Speed Rail To The Next Level



JAPĀN has unveiled its latest high-speed bullet train — capable of travelling at nearly 200mph. The cutting-edge Hayabusa, or Falcon, pulls a luxury carriage modelled on airline business class. It made its official debut yesterday with a trip to northern Japan departing from Tokyo.



The green, pink and silver train is the fastest currently operating in Japan, travelling at speeds of 198mph. Japan has built up a network of high-speed rail lines since the 1960s that criss-cross the island nation.



It now hopes to sell the technology abroad, including to the United States.



Mutsutake Otsuka, chairman of East Japan Railway Co, said: "To the best of our ability, we will strive to improve Hayabusa's passenger comfort, safety and environmental friendliness, not just its speed."



More than 1,000 trainspotters crowded on to the platform at Tokyo's central railway station to see the futuristic train leave. It can make the 420 mile trip to Aomori in just over three hours.





Passengers will glide quietly along the straight stretches and tunnels that cut through Japan's mountainous countryside.



And those willing to pay 26,360yen (£196) for a one-way trip can enjoy the comfort of a GranClass car, where a cabin attendant will serve them food and drinks in their deeply reclining leather seats on thick woollen carpets.
