Newsletter editor, Ted Bleck-Doran read us a Christmas Truce story in the form of a soldier's letter from WWI that had special meeting as our troops come home from Iraq this Christmas season. The highlight among many for the evening event held at Tipton-Haynes State Historic Site, was the drawing for the little N-Scale winter layout that several members had converted from a run-down donated landscaped winter scene into a beautiful, sparkling white winter holiday treasure was won by Janet Slaughter from Kingsport. Janet and her mother picked it up at the museum the next day and are thrilled with it. They plan not only to use it for decoration in their home, but also to add to it and perhaps it will spark a hobby. Janet says she and her family are regular visitors to the Carter Railroad Museum and that they really love watching our trains and marveling at the wonderful miniature worlds that our club has created for them to run through. Thanks go to Allan Morton, Gary Emmert, Jesse Kittle, Tod Eaton, Ted Bleck-Doran, and Fred Alsop for doing the work on this project; to Jim Pahris for his idea that got the project started and for providing the registration cards; and to Bob Barrett of HobbyTownUSA for donating the locomotive, rolling stock and transformer.

The business meeting was brief and our new secretary, **Hobie Hyder**, has a report that will be his first column as a club officer to be found elsewhere in this edition of the newsletter. Some coming events for January will include the planning of the club calendar for 2012 and helping the Carter Chapter NRHS working with the local Sequoia Council Boy Scouts of America to administer the requirements for the railroading merit badge on Saturday, January 21st. **Jim Pahris** will be coordinating this event at the Carter RR Museum. Our club is asked to work with the scouts who will be participating with the layouts. Member **Dave Doughty** will be presenting the Operation Life Saver part of the requirements in room 102 (reserved for the day) and **Gary Emmert** will work with the boys on the prototype railroading aspect of the badge, also in room 102. Mark your calendars for a good turnout of members for that day so we can serve our visitors as well as the Boy Scouts who will be additional guests. We may need a little more help than usual.

ETSU is working on getting an official state license plate for the RR Museum trailer and will assume insurance and maintenance liabilities for it. We need to get a couple of our members who have experience with trailers to check this one out and make suggestions for anything we may need to do to get it ready to transport the Cope Traveling Layout and any other cargos we may wish to haul in the future. If anyone fits this bill and is willing to inspect the trailer some Saturday with me I shall be happy if you would let me know who you are and we shall get this done.

On Wednesday, December 21, 2011, ETSU Provost, Bert Bach, and President, Paul Stanton, approved my request to hire a part-time employee to be the Station Master for the coming year in the Little Engineer's Room of the Carter RR Museum. This person will be trained by the staff of the ETSU Child Study Center and certified in CPR/first aid to be the person who will work every Saturday with the children who come to play in that most popular room. We will begin advertising the position and will expect to hire very soon after the first of the year. The position will be for the calendar year and will serve as a pilot program that hopefully will be renewed in 2013. We will have the benefit of having a person trained to work with young children as a weekly presence in our playroom and Dave Doughty, who has worked so long and faithfully with the families whose children visit this room, will have the option to continue to work with the kids when he want to do so, or to run his trains with the other members, or whatever he wishes to do when he is in the museum. We all need to express our special appreciation to Dave for all the countless hours he has put into the little engineers in the Little Engineer's Room that not only has created a wonderful bond with these families, some who visit regularly, but by doing so he has allowed those of us who just want to run trains and build scenery the time to do so. Thank you David!!!!

A second, pre-Christmas "gift" was bestowed on Wednesday, December 21, 2011, by ETSU. The chairman of the Research Development Committee emailed me to congratulate me on being funded by his committee on a small grant proposal I had submitted with Delanna Reed, instructor in the Graduate Storytelling Program and an Honorary Member 2012 of the MEMRR. The grant is to support for the spring, January to June 30, the collection of oral railroad histories that we began at the RR Museum in the fall of 2010. The funds will be used to pay interviewers to collect these stories from local people who remember the early railroads of the region including the Tweetsie, Southern and the Clinchfield, and to pay transcribers to take the recorded stories and convert them to hardcopy form for preservation. This project will be undertaken by the Carter Chapter NRHS, but some of the interviews may be conducted in the RR Museum as they were before. However, this funding will also allow some of the interviewers to travel to the homes of the storytellers and to conduct longer interviews than we were able to do in the past. If you have knowledge of people you think we should contact for interviews as part of this preservation program, please let me know who they are. So, Wednesday, December 21, 2011, was a very good day for the museum and the two clubs that call it "home".

Looking back down the tracks of 2011 we had another very good year. Our club membership remained around 90 members and we attracted several new members with their special talents and diverse backgrounds. We sustained several big projects that still will move towards completion in 2012 in the HO freight yard project, the HO rewiring project, and the Tweetsie project. The ETSU Centennial Locomotive project was also successfully completed with the addition of funds for the work accomplished being placed in the museum's foundation account to be used on the ET&WNC project. We got enough member donations in a 48 hour period to purchase a great 6 x 12 trailer for our use and to get our distinctive museum logos on it. A lot of things got finished and we had modules that got new owners and modules that are still moving towards completion, but are showing good progress. Our coordinator's meetings have helped us move towards better planning and organization and will be continued in 2012. Geoff Stunkard's creative idea for the monthly Heritage Day Events has been an overwhelming success, not only providing new energy to our museum displays and the opportunity to run some special trains on special Saturdays, but also to infuse the public to come and visit the museum. The monthly publicity generated by the news releases for these events have been widely distributed by the local media and the Carter Railroad Museum, the MEMRR and the Carter Chapter NRHS have all benefited by the wider community recognition we have received as a result. We already have voted to continue this Heritage Day Event program in 2012. The view from the right side of the cab is very good indeed and you all are the reason for it.

Now 2012 is here. Winter has set in and it is a good time for model railroading. The club is solid in both membership and its elected officers. We have a great facility to call our home. 2012 may well be our best year yet. Be a part of it with your energies, your special talents, your passion for model railroading and the companionship and teaching that a club of the size of the Mountain Empire Model Railroaders can offer. Hear the whistle blow in the night and dream of all the destinations yet to come. **Happy New Year!**

President Fred Alsop then introduced Hobie Hyder to the membership as the new Secretary for the MEMRR.

There was no old business.

New business; Gary Emmert brought up the idea of having our annual Christmas Party catered next year. With no motion being brought forth his suggestion may be raised at a future meeting.

President Alsop continued to inform the group about the new club trailer. The trailer has now been lettered with the museum logo and is ready for transporting the Cope layout and other cargos as needed.

At the January meeting of the MEMMR we will be planning the 2012 calendar of events. President Alsop gave special thanks to Geoff Stunkard for his idea to start the Heritage Days at the museum. Since the once a month special day has been deemed a success, they will continue for another year with the first one in January being dubbed Tennessee Mountain Railroading. President Alsop pointed out this would be a great opportunity to come run your Shay Locomotives.

He also told the group about his meeting with University President Stanton concerning acquiring a full time staff person for the Little Engineer's Room to help out with potential safety and legal issues as well as to give Dave Doughty a much needed rest and opportunity to run some trains on Saturday. It was pointed out that during the past nine weeks the kids room has been used by 167 children and their families. A full time staff member would be asked to work a seven hour day and the suggested pay would be \$10/hour with a full calendar year commitment. MEMRR Coordinators Meeting 8 December 2011

Fred Alsop called the meeting to order at 6:00 p.m. in room 235 of the Campus Center Building, ETSU. The reports of the coordinators present follow:

Sales: Duane Swank. Status quo on shirts, patches and hats. Plenty in stock. We have been selling battery-powered Christmas train sets that Jim Pahris obtained from HobbyTownUSA. We have sold 11 of the 12 sets we had on 2 Saturdays at the Carter RR Museum. It was agreed to pick up 12 more sets.

<u>Webmaster: Bob Jones.</u> Getting all member email addresses up to date. The Honorary Members will only get *The Signal Bridge* and not the automatic club reminders.

Displays: Jim Pahris. The December Heritage Day will feature the New York Central RR and associated northeastern railroads. The museum event will be on the 17th of Dec. instead of the last weekend of the month because of the Christmas holidays. Jim and Geoff Stunkard will start changing out the display cases to feature the NYC tonight and continue on Saturday, Dec. 10th.

Other Announcements: (Jim Pahris). 1) Our annual Christmas Party RSVPs are coming in slowly, but all arrangements have been made. 2) Tom McKee donated several New Haven RR deco prints to the Carter Museum and has dropped them off. 3) We will be helping the local Boy Scouts of America council's scouts earn their railroading merit badge on January 21st at the Carter RR Museum with some of the training being held in room 102 just down the hall. We will need members to help on that Saturday.

MEMRR Secretary: Hobie Hyder has agreed to serve as the club secretary for the coming year (thank you, Hobie !!)

<u>Publicity & Events: Hobie Hyder.</u> The club has one more Heritage Day scheduled for this year, but due to their popularity with the public the coordinator for these special days, Geoff Stunkard, has planned with the club's assistance a full slate of Heritage Days for 2012. Hobie plans no special railfan outings until the spring. If members know of upcoming train shows please pass that information on to Ted for inclusion in the newsletter.

<u>Newsletter Editor: Ted Bleck-Doran.</u> There will be masthead changes with the January edition of *The Signal Bridge* to reflect the elected club officers for the next year. The editor requests materials on model railroading, railfanning and other grist for the newsletter. HO-Scale: Electrical: Bill Hensley. 1) The siding on the window side of the room from Larry and Rich's modules to Fred's module has turnouts that are not DCC friendly. His group is working to correct this. Only 4 modules still need wiring work to complete Phase I. 2) Switch #1 on the Switch-8 machine on the new staging yard is losing its memory. Bill will check with the manufacturer, NCE, to see if they have a recommended fix for the problem. 3) Recently a derailed locomotive in the yard Y caused damage. This problem is being studied and will be fixed. 4) Currently our computer is not 'talking' to the Digitrax system.

Large Scale: Jesse Kittle. Improving the locomotives and rolling stock operation with routine maintenance of cleaning wheels and repairing couplers. We arrived to find a leak in the AC unit in the ceiling between the G-Scale and the N-scale layouts had caused a ceiling tile to collapse onto the G-Scale layout, but caused no damage. The AC unit had iced up and the ice was melting into the room. A waste basket was placed under the drip and contained the water. Neither layout sustained any damage (we were lucky). Note: Fred got ETSU maintenance on site early the next morning and the unit was repaired and ceiling tiles replaced. Apparently this unit was still set by its wall thermostat on 'cool' and the cold temperature inside and outside the building had caused the icing problem. Please check during the winter months at all 3 thermostats in room 113 are set to 'heat'.

N-Scale: (Jesse Kittle reporting in Tod's absence). Inventory indicates 117 freight cars operational and many more on the RIP track. Plans to create a roster of operational locomotives and their operating characteristics (some get hot after a few hours and quit running; some start slow and race when they warm up, etc.) to provide an operator's guide for smoother operation of the layout.

Treasurer's Request: Duane Swank. Each coordinator working with the MEMRR's budgeted funds for purchases is asked to estimate their section's expenses for the coming year so that monies can be earmarked and encumbered by the treasure to cover them. It is assumed there will be unexpected expenses during the year, but some of our projects on the HO-scale layout (the only layout in the museum funded with MEMRR monies) can have costs for the year estimated and having this information will help the treasurer better plan the funding, or partial funding, for them. In a related subject, the club is asked to continue to gather surplus model railroading items and place them in room 110 so they can be inventoried, priced and offered for sale to club members or for sales and swap meets outside the club.

There being no further business the meeting was adjourned at approximately 7:25 p.m.

WHAT MIGHT HAVE BEEN: THOUGHTS ABOUT SAM INSULL'S EMPIRE Photos and Commentary By

It was long ago when Chicago's interurban and rapid transit companies were under common ownership. Both the North Shore Line and the Chicago Aurora & Elgin were physically connected to the "L," enabling passenger and parcel express cars to traverse all three roads. Of course, no such physical connection or compatibility existed between the 600-volt DC third rail lines and the 1,500-volt DC overhead wire South Shore Line ... but it's fun to imagine what might have been!



The first attached image shows the Randolph & Wells Loop "L" station during the IRM Snowflake Special on 2/24/1974, composited with a photo of CSS&SB freight locomotive 803 taken at Garv Station on 6/16/1977. Oddly enough, a group of four retired CTA 4000-series "L" cars was temporarily stored in Michigan City at the CSS&SB Shops during the mid-1970s. As the other two photos will attest, these were within sight of the 800-class locomotives. I believe the "L" cars later went to museums, as did 802 and 803.

We can only speculate how 803 might have looked and sounded screeching around the tortuous curves on the "L."



IT'S IN THE DETAILS: TWO ADDITIONS FOR THE FOREGROUND (An Occasional Column for 2012) Photos and Narrative By Ted Bleck-Doran

The first kit featured this month is the **1950's Red Farm Tractor with Loader (#60-005)** by GHQ. It is a finely detailed model cast in soft pot metal. The kit comes with excellent assembly instructions with tips on painting and assembly options.



The tractor can be assembled with the bucket up or down as well as with the arms up or down as shown in the pictures. The leftover part can go in the scrap bin for use later (more about that below). A cast driver is included as well.

The casting come with a surprising little flash and mold lines to tough up. A good jeweler's file will take care of what's visible. Care with handling the castings is advised. The pot metal is soft and will deform with rough handling. Some of the pieces may need aligning having been bent during packaging or shipping.

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I opted to model the tractor with the bucket arms up and the bucket empty. I also decided that I would leave out the driver since one anticipates a vehicle to move with the driver included.



Assembly is straight forward though care must be taken in selecting the proper arms, positioning the arms on the axles, and choice of the guides (uprights at the front of the tractor). I used Hobbytown fast setting CA glue with gap filler.

Painting makes the model. I chose Bright Red acrylic, Black, Burnt Siena (rust), Silver and Brown for mud. The body and wheel hubs were painted with a base coat of red. The tires received a coat of black. Piston armatures and guides got silver accents. Then everything got a wash of black – you'll be surprised at how the details pop out at this stage, Then I finished the model off with dry brushed accents of mud and rust. I wanted the tractor to look well used and worn. The second model has been around for several years. It is a Woodland Scenics **Old Time Truck with Flatbed Trailer**. Like the red tractor the model is cast pot metal. Woodland Scenics castings show their age with much more flashing and mold lines. There was even some noticable warping evident in the larger pieces. A good file and a Dremel grinding bit or abrasive block will take care for the flashing and mold lines. Slight finger pressure will take care of most of the warping.



Assembly instructions are adequate though some testing and fitting of the subassemblies is required. Woodland Scenics has provided suggesting for weathering and detailing the model.



Painting was a breeze. Turn of the century equipment could be fairly uncomplicated and straight forward. A basic brown truck and trailer body color was an obvious choice for a rundown tractor trailer. I painted the trailer decking a light grey. The tires got basic black. Everything then got a wash of black to bring out the details.

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The model then got highlights of rust and mud just like the red tractor.

What makes the model are the pallets and detail parts. The truck comes with 5 pallets, several empty – a couple with loads. After filing of the flash and mold lines each got a coat of grey followed by black wash and dry brushing of mud and rust. I added some of the part from the red tractor kit and a set of oil barrels and a variety of trash items from thee scrap box.

I have just the right spots for each of these models. I have no doubt that they will be highlights to the scenes.
