MEMRR BYLAWS REVISIONS ADOPTED

MOUNTAIN EMPIRE MODEL RAILROADERS BYLAWS

Adopted Date: 18 September, 2012

Article I. The name of this organization shall hereafter be known as, <u>Mountain Empire Model</u> Railroaders (MEMRR).

Article II. The officers of this organization shall be elected by popular vote of the membership at the November business meeting each year and retain that office for one calendar year. The officers shall consist of a President, Vice President, Secretary, Treasurer, Newsletter Editor, and Webmaster. The duties of each officer are enumerated in the Appendix to the Bylaws.

Article III. Committees shall be drawn from the general membership with appointments made by the president based on interest of the individual members and needs of the club.

Article IV. Membership is open to any individual with a sincere interest in model railroading.

<u>A full adult member</u> is defined as one who pays "full member" dues as set by the club in Article VIII and is willing to construct or assist with the building and/or operation of one or more modules or layouts which meets the club specifications. <u>Only paid up full members</u> will have access to the museum key box. This will include a digitally available copy of the club newsletter known as "The Signal Bridge".

<u>A youth member</u> is a non-voting member between 14 and 18 years of age and will be accepted if sponsored by a full adult member. The adult member will accept full responsibility, financial and otherwise, for their sponsored youth.

<u>A family member</u> is part of a full adult member's household, interested in model railroading and who will support club activities. Household members will have one vote per adult over 18 years of age.

<u>A student member</u> is a voting member who is a full-time student enrolled in any private or public community college, college or university. Proof of student status may be required to establish and maintain student membership. This will include a digitally available copy of the club newsletter known as **"The Signal Bridge"**.

<u>An associate member</u> is one who would like to receive the club newsletter (*The Signal Bridge*") by a digitally available copy, supports the club, and will be non-voting.

<u>An emeritus member</u> is one who has been a long time active member who is voted to this lifetime non-voting status by 2/3's vote of the membership present. This will include a digitally available copy of the club newsletter known as **"The Signal Bridge"**.

<u>An honorary member</u> is one who has been awarded special non-voting membership for outstanding contribution by a non-member. To be established by 2/3's vote and renewed by similar vote at each November meeting. This will include a digitally available copy of the club newsletter known as "The Signal Bridge"..

<u>Article V.</u> Election of officers and changes to the constitution or bylaws must be announced to the membership no less than one month in advance. Membership will consist of all individuals listed

on the official roll kept by the treasurer. Changes to the aforementioned documents of the club will require a vote "in the affirmative" of one more than half the voting membership. Passage of regular business items will require a majority vote of the members present at the meeting when the item is on the floor. Members must be sent notice of special called meetings no less than one week in advance of the proposed "called meeting" date.

Article VI. The regularly scheduled business meeting of this organization shall be the third Tuesday evening of each month.

<u>Article VII.</u> These bylaws may be amended by the membership, as deemed necessary, by the process set forth in Article V.

Article VIII. Each member will pay his or her dues to the treasurer no later than January 31st. At this time non-paid members will be removed from the distribution of the newsletter with the February edition. An extension may be granted upon approval by the President and the Treasurer. The key box code to the George L. Carter Railroad Museum door is to be changed each January. The dues will be fixed for the next year at the November meeting and published in the minutes of that meeting.

Article IX. The President may appoint an Audit Committee once a year to audit the books and physical assets of the Treasurer and to count the "cash on hand" kept by the Treasurer. The audit report will take place after the November business meeting and thereby present the incoming administration an accurate and verified base for the new year.

Article X. All club funds will be kept and maintained by the Treasurer. All expenditures must be submitted to the Treasurer for reimbursement upon receipt of appropriate receipts. All club funds will be maintained by the Treasurer. Upon termination of this club, all funds remaining will be used to pay outstanding debts. Any clubowned property will be sold and the proceeds, along with any remaining cash funds, will be donated to a 501C3 organization.

Article XI. This club has been organized and will operate exclusively for the pleasure, education, and recreation of its members. No part of the club's income and/or contributions will accumulate for the benefit of any member.

Article XII. Unfinished modules shall show substantial improvements in a timely manner. If recommended improvements are not implemented on schedule after advisement from the Executive Committee (officers of the MEMRR), the disposition of the module or modules will be brought to a vote by the membership.

Article XIII. Each full member is encouraged to work the equivalent of one full Saturday, or two half-day Saturdays, at the current club display venue per month. Each member is to sign up for scheduled operating days and/or special events in advance so adjustments can be made to schedule. Showing up unscheduled with staffing already scheduled is encouraged but will not count towards fulfillment of this commitment.

Article XIV. Approved expenditures shall not exceed original estimates by more than 10% unless prior approval by the Treasurer and one other executive officer. (Executive officers are: President and Vice President). No expenditures will be reimbursed without receipt and all receipts must be signed and dated by the purchaser.

Article XV. "The Signal Bridge" newsletter. Free via digital format to eligible members in good standing. For those who prefer hard copies, there will be an additional \$15.00 yearly fee for basic section and additional \$15.00 for bonus additions.

Article XVI. Pro-rated dues rates for new members who sign up during the year.

Jan. thru Mar. 100%

Apr. thru June 75% (for balance of the current year)
July thru Oct 50% (for balance of the current year)
Nov. and Dec 100% (this will include the following

year's dues)

APPENDIX TO THE MEMRR BYLAWS

Duties of the Officers of the Organization

President:

- 1. Prepare meeting agenda and preside over the Monthly Business Meeting.
- 2. Appoint Committees for various tasks as necessary.
- 3. Maintain contact with Train Show operators.
- 4. Prepare and disseminate monthly "Train News Report".
- Assign individuals to specific tasks, i.e., Program Director, Recording Secretary, Specification Librarian, etc.
- Provide contact point for local media, civic organizations and political leaders.
- 7. Is responsible for promotional aspects of the club, i.e., club logo, club brochures, media news releases, etc.

Vice President:

- 1. Preside at monthly business meeting in the absence of the President.
- 2. Is responsible for monthly club programs.

Secretary:

- 1. Take minutes at Monthly Business Meeting (a Recording Secretary may be appointed by the President to perform this function.)
- 2. Send copies of minutes to newsletter editor.
- 3. Maintain club archives.
- 4. Originates official club correspondence (i.e.: thank you cards/letters, condolences/etc.)

Treasurer:

- Maintain club funds and account for same in writing.
- Collect annual club funds due from members and associate members.
- 3. Prepare monthly financial report (income and expenditures) and submit it to the Newsletter Editor for publication in the monthly Newsletter.
- 4. Prepare Annual Financial Report.
- 5. Maintain current Active Membership Roll.
- Compile and keep a roll of inactive and former members.
- Order club shirts, caps, patches and other club items

Newsletter Editor:

- 1. Publish and distribute monthly newsletter, "The Signal Bridge".
- 2. E-mail "*The Signal Bridge*" club newsletter to all members who have elected to receive it electronically.

Webmaster:

- Secure and maintain a suitable web host for the MEMRR web site. (Insure that yearly host fees are paid)
- Design and create MEMRR and George L. Carter Railroad Museum web pages.
- Maintain and update web pages in a timely manner
- 4. Maintain an E-mail list of all members with computer access.
- 5. Notify all members with computer access of important upcoming club events.
- Once all versions (extra and/or bonus) of "The Signal Bridge" club newsletter are released they will be combined into one monthly edition and then posted on the MEMRR Website in a timely manner.

7. Maintain MEMRR E-mail server.

Communications Coordinator:

- Mails out copies of "The Signal Bridge" and other pertinent communications to members lacking email capabilities. (Club to provide the coordinator with duplication services or reimbursement for duplication and mailing).
- 2. Establish a call list to facilitate short notification of club activities or needs. (this is in conjunction with the Webmaster's email distribution of event notification).
- Make welcoming contacts with new members to ensure contact information is accurate, administer a New Member Interest Survey, and periodically report to the membership (through the Coordinators Meeting, General Business Meeting or The Signal Bridge) on the results of the Member Interest Survey.

<u>Librarian:</u> (Duties under the auspices of the George L. Carter Railroad Museum ETSU)

- > There will be finger foods and drinks for our guests and our volunteers.
- > The Carter Legacy DVDs should be available for sale that day as well.

I'll keep you posted via our Club Website as all this comes together and as I have more details. But, it should be a grand party and I hope you mark you calendars to be present that Saturday to enjoy the celebration and to help us with the extra guests we will be expecting and, of course acting as hosts for our anniversary. With the event comes a lot of pre-preparation. We need to use the weeks leading up to November 17th to take some extra time to put the best face possible on the museum. Module owners and coordinators need to be sure the layouts are clean from top-to-bottom, that all the trash that has been accumulating in the work areas and on the construction areas on the layouts is picked up and out of sight. We will potentially

have a lot of visitors and ETSU administrators and we want the museum to look as good as possible. I am asking all of you to look around the museum and do whatever you can to tidy up the place and put a shine on it. We are going to have an important birthday party and we need to do a little housekeeping to be ready for it. Thanks in advance for your cooperation and your support.

November will also bring plans for holiday clinics and other events for the Club at the Carter RR Museum. We need to make plans to continue the "how-to" clinic on model railroad layout building by completing the 6 foot module that we started last November. Last year we put together a small N-Scale layout with a winter scheme and "raffled" it off with visitors filling out an information card and the winner being announced at our annual Christmas Holiday Party. Our friend and the owner of **HobbyTown USA**, **Bob Barrett**, has moved his hobby shop from its familiar location across from the Mellow Mushroom to a bigger location further east. Bob has long been a supporter of the MEMRR and the Carter Railroad Museum and we need to continue to support our only local hobby shop. Plan to visit him at his new location soon and see what he has to offer to support our hobby.

Very soon after you get your October edition copy of *The Signal Bridge* the **Carter Chapter NRHS** and the Carter Railroad Museum will be taking 102 participants in 2 Greene Coach Line buses to Bryson City, NC, for a ride on **the Smoky Mountain Railroad.** The trip is set for Saturday, October 20th and will depart from an ETSU parking lot. This is the second rail excursion that the Chapter and the Museum have organized and sponsored this year, the first was in June to Stearns, KY and the Big South Fork Scenic

Railroad, and it, too, has proved to be a most successful venture. These events not only draw public attention to the NRHS chapter and to the Railroad Museum, but they provide the opportunity to recruit new members to our organizations as well as acting as fund-raisers for them. I want to thank all the MEMRR members, many of whom are members of the Carter Chapter NRHS, for your continued support and participation in these rail excursion events. MOUNTAIN EMPIRE MODEL RAILROADERS MEETING MINUTES September 18, 2012

President Fred Alsop called the meeting to order at 6:48 P.M. in room 312 Brown Hall, ETSU, with 19 members present. (Meeting was scheduled to start at 6:30 P.M. however was delayed due to the President's Classroom).

President Alsop called on Hobie Hyder, Secretary for the reading of the Secretary's report from the August meeting. After a brief discussion, Secretary Hyder made a motion to except the minutes as read with Paul Haynes seconding the motion. The minutes were approved by a unanimous vote by the membership. Ted Bleck-Doran, Newsletter Editor, announced October 7th as the official deadline for anything to be published in October edition of "The Signal Bridge".. Ted reminded the group that he is always on the lookout for, and appreciates all, articles and items of interest for

publication in The Signal Bridge, and any and all help from the membership is appreciated. President Alsop suggested an article about how to become a Master Modeler following the club's successful Modeling Contest. President Alsop stated that one could go to the NMRA website and follow the links for more information. Treasurer, Duane Swank, reported the club's checking account balance as of August. President Alsop, following the Treasurer's report, sought to clear up any misunderstandings about club finances by stating that the club is solvent and not out of money. He stated that this year was no different than any other year and by this time every year the clubs finances were lower. President Alsop continued to clarify that dues being paid to the model railroad club goes for the publication of The Signal Bridge. Get Well Cards, Postage and the HO Scale club owned layouts only. The museum has a budget for the ET&WNC layout, G-Scale and N-Scale layouts. In the absence of Webmaster, Bob Jones, President Alsop informed the group that Bob continues to update the club's website and is doing a good job. Vice-President John Carter reported to the membership that Paul Haynes will give a presentation on Norfolk Southern's Heritage Locomotives for the October meeting. The November program will feature a "how-to" clinic on various techniques used to weather the different entries in the recently concluded Modeling Contest. President Alsop begin the President's Report by thanking everyone for their help during the President's Classroom. He told the group that President Nolan stated that the Carter Railroad Museum was a world class museum. President Alsop also thanked everyone who worked hard to move and work with the Cope Traveling Layout at the Erwin Train Show. Congratulations were given by President Alsop to all the contestants that participated in the Model Railroad Weathering Contest. Lastly, President Alsop gave a big Engineer "hats off" to Bill Hensley, Picnic Coordinator, and the "taxi" drivers who helped make the Annual Cub Picnic a huge success.

Old Business:

A brief update was given by Hobie Hyder, on the Modeling Contest in retrospect. Hobie Hyder, Event Coordinator gave thanks to everyone who helped make the contest a success. A special thanks was given to Allan Morton, Jim Hoit and Thomas Kinsley for all their contest work "above and beyond". A motion from the June meeting made by Alan Morton for hobby shops links to our club website will be revisited at the October meeting due to Alan's absence. Clarification was offered by President Alsop about the recently purchased wheel sets for the donated rolling stock. He stated that the wheel sets should have been purchased by the museum and not the club. President Alsop also informed the club that all rolling stock belonging to the club has a yellow or orange dot on the bottom and rolling stock belonging to the museum will have a different color. He explained the purpose behind the color-code marking of the cars was for accounting purposes and that the club may use any of the museum cars on the HO layout. President Alsop concluded the discussion of Old Business by informing the membership that the recent changes to the By-Laws passed overwhelming (only 1 negative vote) and the amended date would reflect this month's date.

'NEW BUSINESS:

Geoff Stunkard informed the club the next 'Railroad Heritage Day' will be September 29th. The theme will be 'First Generation Diesels'. Due to the moving of the Cope Traveling Layout to the Erwin Train Show, the August Coordinator's Meeting was canceled. President Alsop called on Coordinator's to give a brief update to the membership. Electrical Coordinator Bill Hensley told the group that he and Rey Dennis have the 110v wiring 2/3rds done. Bill stated that he needs help with switching over the DCC. Jim Hoit, told the group that red will be the new color denoting museum owned property while yellow and some orange will mark club owned property. Jim Hoit and Geoff Stunkard have inventoried and set aside a bunch of new rolling stock, locomotives and buildings from donated items for club use. Jessie Kittle told the group that he has contacted Bachman about doing the repairs on the donated G-Scale locomotive by President Fred Alsop and that he was awaiting an authorization number from them before shipping it to them. Alsop said the RR Museum would pay for the repair, not the MEMRR. Jessie said that ballasting and scenery work continues on the N-Scale John Carter informed the group that work continues on the left hand side of the new yard. He is presently working on the turnouts. John recommended someone check and test the wiring under the new turnouts before proceeding with the vard work. Geoff Stunkard reminded the group that everything under the new yard will have to be temporally relocated in order to complete the work on the new yard. President Alsop asked Duane Swank to show the club a sample vented hat worn by the members of the Carter Chapter NHRS to see if they might be interested in ordering a similar one for the club. Duane Swank told the club that he was low on medium and largesized kids' hats and that he needed to order soon. Ted Bleck-Doran asked the club what they wanted to do for Clinics for the Holiday Season. President Alsop reminded everyone that we still had an unfinished module from last year that could be completed and used and that we could build a small N-Scale layout with a holiday theme to raffle off as we did last year. President Alsop concluded the Coordinator's Reports by reminding everyone that this November will mark the museums 5th Anniversary and that he wanted to do something special to mark the occasion.

In other 'New Business', Ted Bleck-Doran continued to stir the pot concerning funding for the club/museum. Ted made a motion that a committee be appointed by President Alsop to develop a financial plan to augment funding for the museum/club and discuss possible new income streams. Jessie Kittle seconded the motion. President Alsop reminded the club that donors for the Kids room and the Main room were still needed and that finding donors would

go a long way in helping with funding. He also reminded the group about the donation boxes located inside the Little Engineer's Room and the Main Room of the museum. Discussions on the motion were concluded and motion passed with Ted Bleck-Doran being appointed as Chair, Mark Woomer, Dan McLeod, Jessie Kittle, Fred Alsop and Geoff Stunkard volunteering to serve on the committee. Paul Haynes closed out new business with the suggestion that the club look at the Choo Choo Café in Erwin as a possible place to hold next year's Christmas party. President Alsop proposed that the club consider planning a spring social event there as both he and Paul stated the food and atmosphere was really good.

Before being adjourned, President Fred Alsop reminded the membership that the next Coordinators Meeting will be Thursday, November 11th with Vice-President John Carter presiding. Volunteers for Saturdays' Operating Sessions were then asked for by Present Alsop. Bob Jones' DVD on

'Railroads in Chicago" was shown by President Alsop. Meeting was adjourned at approximately 9:00 P.M. Next meeting will be Tuesday, October 16th with Vice-President John Carter presiding in Fred's absence at 6:30 P.M. in room 312 at Brown Hall, ETSU.

THE TRAIN LADY OF WANDERING TREE GARDEN RAILROADING AT ITS BEST







Further Update on the Z-Scale Layout From Gary Emmert And James Gregg

James Gregg and I have spent 4 days working on the layout. We work about 3 hours at a time for a total time of 24 hours of work so far.



We have removed the foam base under the track, and, using hydrocal, we have been able to build up a base so we can lay the cork which we are doing on main 1.



There are 4 mains to do. While we are doing this in some places we have to do main 2 so that the crossovers are done at the same time.



We have started putting down the rail in some places on main 1. We will not take up any of mains #3 or #4 till we have completed #1 and #2.



We will send further updates as we complete more of the layout. We moved the layout from Todd's house to Gary's house back in June 2012. There is a lot more to go.
