

Our winter remains cold and the promise of spring seems far away as we reach mid-February, but our MEMRR members have remained active working on their hobby at home, attending train shows and supporting the Carter Railroad Museum by operating the layouts on Saturdays and coming to help with the many model railroad projects on Thursday nights. Thanks to all of you for all you do for the hobby, for our model railroad club and for the railroad museum. The club is a very strong one because of the number of active members we have and the railroad museum could not operate without you.

The February issue of *The Signal Bridge* that you are now reading is an important milestone because it means that the Mountain Empire Model Railroad club is important enough for you to have once more renewed your membership and you will be with us another year. The MEMRR is the largest model railroad club in the region and we have entered our 21st year as a club; another milestone. For those of you who have been with us for much of these past two decades you have seen many changes. We begin meeting once monthly at the Gray Elementary School and as a modular model railroad club that only got to set up the club's member's modules into a working DC layout only once or twice a year; and then only for a couple of days each time. The club's membership numbered around 30-35 members for the first 14 years of its existence. About 10 years ago the club voted to explore the new technology of DCC and we slowly converted our layout and some of our personal locomotives to operate in this new mode. Shortly afterwards sound came to some of our locomotives and we embraced new possibilities and the more realistic operations that the new technology provided. Around 2004 ETSU's director of the Reese Museum, Blair White, invited the club to display our layout in the basement of this ETSU museum and we were able to have the layout set up and operating for several months for the first time in our history.

That time in the Reese allowed us to work on our modules and the operation of our club's layout as we had never been able to do before and the layout was greatly improved. In 2005 we were invited to move to Tipton-Haynes State Historic Site south of the city by its director, Penny McLaughlin and we remained there for 18 months. As before, we were able to access the layout whenever we needed to, display it to the public on Saturdays and on Sunday afternoons, and to continue to attract more members to the club. ETSU President, Paul E. Stanton, Jr., invited us to return to the ETSU campus and in the spring of 2007 we were given 2,400 sq. ft. of space in the Campus Center Building as the beginning of what would become the George L. Carter Railroad Museum. The museum was formally dedicated with a ceremony attended by President Stanton and other ETSU administrators, many notable community leaders, Mariam Bankus (who had donated the Bankus N-Scale layout), and two living cousins of George L. Carter, in addition to may model railroaders. In our 6+ years at ETSU our MEMRR membership has tripled and the size of the museum has doubled to more than 5,000 sq. ft. The only thing that has remained unchanged for the past decade is the price of membership; still only \$30.00 a year. Some of you who are our newer members have not had the opportunity to be with the club as it has grown, become more complex, and matured into a modern active model railroad club that enjoys a home in a great facility, uses cutting edge technology including our recent move to cab control by radio on the club layout, and is the focus of a lot of community attention and support. More than 3,000 people from the region, and more distant locations, now visit the railroad museum to share your hobby and to see the exhibits you have created each year. We truly have come a long way together as our long-time members will Congratulations! Each of you is a most valued member.

I continue to work with the officers of the ET&WNC RR Historical Society in the planning of their 26th annual convention that will be co-hosted by the Carter RR Museum and convened in the Carnegie Hotel in Johnson City 27-29 June. A great keynote speaker who is extremely knowledgeable on the "Tweetsie" railroad will be the evening speaker on Friday night. A train show is being planned for Saturday along with visits to the Carter RR Museum, an afterhours ride on the Tweetsie Railroad in Blowing Rock, NC with dinner at the Tweetsie Palace on the park's grounds. Sunday will offer a train ride on the Tweetsie ROW into the Doe River Gorge to Pardee Point and travel to Newland, NC in the afternoon to see the restoration of the Linville Depot and the 505 ET&WNC caboose that has been recently donated to the Avery County Museum and is now on public display. The

public is invited to participate in only a few of these events, but members can take advantage of them all. Annual membership is only \$20 and I would urge you to take advantage of all it can provide for this one convention alone that will be in our back yard by joining. While we are on the subject of the ET&WNC RR let me make you aware of a great article about the railroad entitled, "Eat Taters and Wear no Clothes" by Ron Flanary published in *Classic Trains* magazine, spring 2014.

Secondly, the Tweetsie Trail Taskforce in Johnson City is currently clearing the 6 miles of the developing trail on the abandoned roadbed from Alabama Street (just east of the engine house on Legion St.) to Sycamore Shoals State Historic Park in Elizabethton. Trail surfacing will soon follow and the bridges will be decked, railing installed and benches will be located along the trail. Dedication and opening is planned for Labor Day 2014. Additional sections of the trail will be developed following the opening of the first 6 miles. I serve on this taskforce and will keep you posted on developments.

Our own "Tweetsie" Project continues to progress. With "Cranberry Mountain" mostly sceniced now, attention has turned to completing track work in the Cranberry yard and tracks leading into it. This also involves additional wiring and the installation of switch machine motors. Member **Michael Pascal** from Taylors, SC, has made another trip to work in the

museum in early February. Michael is donating his time to build to ET&WNC RR specifications the 4 metal bridges that were used to span the Doe River at Valley Forge, in the gorge, and at Blevins. The Blevins Bridge is completed and you need to drop in to see for yourself how great it looks. Michael has been using some parts from Central Valley bridge kits, but this is kit-bashing at its best with Grandt Line turnbuckles and brass rods and eyes for the pin-connected bridges. Michael and I made an afternoon field trip to walk the Tweetsie ROW and get additional photographs of the bridges and the stone abutments that support them so we could more accurately model them on the layout.

Our sister organization in the Carter RR Museum, the G.L. Carter Chapter NRHS, continues to plan a rail excursion pulled by a steam locomotive on the 3 Rivers Rambler RR in Knoxville coupled with dinner on the Tennessee River that afternoon on May 24th. Please mark this date on your calendar for day of fun and support your museum's NRHS chapter. Buses will take us from ETSU to Knoxville and back so you can relax and enjoy the ride by bus, train and boat. Details will be provided as we have them for you.

Some of our members continue to work on the new freight yard on the club's HO layout and it is getting nearer to the point when all the track will be laid in place. The electronics crew has been busy making the electrical connections that will provide power to our locomotives and you will have to see the great LED-lighted boards that Larry Jackson has created and installed at each end of the yard for clarity of operation. John Edwards has been working hard to integrate radio operation on the layout and several of the members are now using radios to improve communications and overall operations in the yard and on the mainline. These members could use your help to complete these tasks and make the yard and the layout fully operational. When everything is

completed our layout will not only be greatly improved, but operations on it should be much smoother, more fun and much more realistic. There is a small learning curve associated with the new technology and the yard configuration, so I urge you to come down to the museum often on Saturdays and get some friendly tutoring from the "pros" that will soon bring you up to speed on the layout. Please don't hesitate to ask for help if you need it as all the members will be most ready to assist you in getting the most out of operating you trains, or the club's, over the HO layout. If you operate in N-Scale or G-Gauge we have layouts ready for you to use as well. Come join in the fun of model railroading with your club on Saturdays and don't forget we can use your talents, your help and your experience any Saturday for operations and any Thursday evening for exhibit construction and maintenance.

The fellows have temporary space in the Paint Shop of the ETSU Facilities Management building on the southwest end of the university campus. They are creating a wonderful layout that Larry Jackson is wiring so that 5 trains and a street car line will operate 10 hours daily under computer control with hands-off by humans. If you have not seen what they are building you need to drop by sometime in the next few weeks an check it out. Tremendous work! When the Tupelo Honey Café opens thousands of patrons will be able to see what our model railroad club members can do and this layout should be motivation to many to come visit the Carter RR Museum. MEMRR Dispatcher report: Date, January 21, 2014 First work train of 2014 was called for 6:30 in the pm.

Conductor, Dr. F. Alsop, Engineer, J. Carter

Crew consisted of 18 regulars and two new members from the extra board.

New members Mike Baker, and Michael Paschall

Total crew of 22 souls onboard was accounted for.

• So, with the switches aligned and the derail in the dirt, Conductor Alsop called the departure right on the button at 6:30 and we pulled E A S T (east) onto the M A I N (main) line..

Tonight's Lineup:

- First up was welcoming of everyone. Conductor F.Alsop then "railroaded" the past meetings minutes as posted in the previous signal Bridge most likely due to the note taker that December night. All in favor, say "Aye", Minutes approved.
- Then a reminder that dues are "due" and payable until the end of January. After that, they are "past due" dues, but still payable. Please forward your check to G.Emmert (Gary) our Treasurer marked dues and for the appropriate amount. Full-\$30, Associate-\$12, Family member-\$5, and student-\$12.
- A reminder, should you want to get a message out to the entire membership, please send that message in the form of an email to J.Edwards (Web Master) and he can post it to the membership for you.
- This is the 21st year of our gatherings as a club and, believe it or not, it is still not too late to get that 20th year logo patch designed and submitted for approval.
- Concluding his opening remarks, Conductor F.Alsop reported we had a multitude of visitors over the holidays with SRO (standing room only) and a waiting line for the little engineers room. Word is getting around that the G.L.Carter Railroad Museum is the place to be on Saturday Mornings. The crew then settled into completing the assigned tasks at hand.

Old Issues:

- J.Stunkard will be processing the Photo Contest photos to Dick Nelson for judging offsite.
- Member P.Haynes had a photo published in the new Clinchfield No.1 book.
- J.Edwards is preparing to order the new radios and headsets. Express your order to him. Cost will be \$49.00 for two radios & one charger base. Headsets are an additional \$23 each. (2-radios+2-headsets=\$95.00) Radios are sold in pairs with a single charger between them.
- Club will be purchasing radios in lots of three to be used by individuals without radios. **However**, should you wish to use one of these on a Saturday, you will need to **Purchase** one of the headsets available as they will NOT be used among different individuals. The headset will remain yours.
- B.Hensley and J.Hoit openly discussed the NMRA "Compliance Station" that has been proposed. This will enable all cars to be properly checked for weight (1oz + ½ oz per inch of length) and coupler height. It is preferred that metal wheels also be installed on all visiting rolling stock. This is the result of our ever changing track work and the desire to reduce downtime due to derailments and dirty track. All personal rolling stock on layout must meet NMRA standards.
- If your personal rolling stock or tools are to remain on the layout, you should select a color from the color chart located within the yard area and mark your equipment accordingly. This will reduce the chance of someone "Unknowingly" walking away with someone else's 25 pound hammer or railroad equipment. And, if this does happen, the rightful owner can quickly be located by checking the chart.
- The RIP track (desk area at the center of the layout) has a request. If a piece of equipment has an issue & you place an offending car or engine on the RIP track, please take a moment & note the cause

New Issues:

• J.Pahris reported on the Tupelo Honey project railroad. Trains are running and progress is being made per our schedule. Work is being done at the ETSU maintenance shops in the paint area should you desire to assist in the building of this N-Scale project. L.Anderson and J.Pahris will be posting pictures of the progress being made at a later date.

- G.Emmert announced that there are a few Green "UNMARKED" shirts for sale (like our club shirts) at \$7.00 each. See Gary for selection.
- The Operating Budget was set for 2014 with the various holdings determined for each operating division of the MEMR..
- The Railroad has announced a "Spring Cleanup" event. Check your modules. Please remove any unnecessary construction materials, or miscellaneous items off the "Property" (floor beneath your module) and tidy up the "Right of Way" clean up any dusty buildings, vehicles, etc., clean your track, and remove any unsightly items from public view. Your M.O.W. department will appreciate it.
- G.Emmert announced the club has accrued a surplus of various rolling stock and buildings. These unneeded units will be sold at a discount price to first come first served club members. Please see Gary for a description of what is available.
- A motion was made to transfer the Cope Layout to G.L.Carter RR Museum property. After, much discussion and determining factors of "work and money" the Motion failed to pass.
- J.Carter made a motion to present each member's name that is deceased on a plaque to honor their membership. After discussion it was decided to add a picture of the member as well. Vote was taken and motion passed Unanimously.
