Editors Note

As I have stated in past notes, I grew up on the main line of the PRR and rode on a lot of MUTS and behind a lot of GG-1's. It is with much regret that I did not take a lot of pictures of the trains and stations, but you have to remember it was a common experience and did not seem out of the ordinary. Little did I know then that the days of commuting from our little station would be ending in the late 60's. I still have a picture somewhere of our station and I purchased 2 books of PRR standard structures, alas our station was one of a kind and is not in the books. The structure on the southbound side, however, is in the book as it was a standard shelter for the PRR. I remember that shed being used at about 4 stations that we stopped at on the way back to Iselin from NYC or Newark.

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One of the things I do remember was that the conductors and brakemen on the commuter trains were very friendly and accommodating. Seems like I would always get to the station in plenty of time to obtain a newspaper (The New York Daily News for 5 cents!) and see if my sister would be running for the train as usual. We only lived three blocks from the station and because Auth Avenue was on an angle, I could see if she was on her way. About 99% of the time she was OK and just running up the stairs as the train pulled in. But on some occasions it would be necessary for me to inform the Conductor that a passenger was a little late and would he hold the train for her to make it. Needless to say, they would always delay the train from 30 seconds to a minute for my sister. I still can see her running up the stairs as the train waited. Those were the Good Old days.

My Sister became a Nun in 1956 and is still active at 84 years old. The good thing is she doesn't have to run for the train anymore and has finally retired as a Curriculum Librarian at Mt. Saint Mary's College in Newburgh New York. I sure do miss holding the train for her though.
