WEATHERING A SIGNALTOWER

TOWARDS A MORE REALISTIC APPEARANACH

MODELING PHOTOSAND TEXT BY LOGAN HEATON



So finally time to work on the interlocking tower for the module trying to take the plastic look of the model.





I remember using this technique to start near when I first started working on the module so did need some reminding sense that was almost a year ago.



Another view of the weathering effects on the tower's end wall.



Pretty much it is called black wash with a mix of black ink in this case and alcohol then with downward brush strokes gives the look of dirt and of course soot and ash from the steam engines being streamed down the building from rain while also giving some more depth to the building.



Did a bit more on the signal box after the black wash dried this time following it up with a flat finish to take off the last of the plastic look and some areas where the glue came through to give it a more realistic look.



To further dull the plastic sheen a coat of flat finish was applied.



Another work day at the museum was spent to finish off a bit more of the module. To start I used the dry brush technique with a bit of white paint to finish off the weathering of the signal box highlighting some of the darker surfaces while giving the building a bit more of a worn look.



As the signal box dried I then went to finish the last little corner of my module placing glue down for the dirt and grass.



By then the signal box was dry so was able to put it in place and work it into the scenery starting with the dirt then following it up with a couple grass patches then going through the steps I did previously.



First soaking the area and then dripping the glue and water mix over it to keep the scenery in place.



Finish it off with placing some bushes along the edge and that finished off the area for now. After over a year of work the module is almost finished just a couple little things I want to add before calling it done for now.



I finished off my work session with something I wasn't expecting to find in one of the old junk drawers which was some HO scale people for the town.



I placed the people around the town and at the facilities making the place look a bit more active apart from the rail activity. All in all I feel I got a great amount of progress done over the past few days.







GEORGE L CARTER MUSEUM'S HERITAGE DAY THEME FOR FEBRUARY SMALL INDUSTRIAL AND SHORTLINE RAILROADING



The epoch age of American industry will be remembered at the Heritage Day event at the George L Carter Railroad Museum. On Saturday, February 23, the free-entry multiroom facility located in the Campus Center Building of East Tennessee State University will showcase several unique industrial-oriented railroad operations on exhibit.


Short lines were just what the name implies, railroad companies that normally operated less than 200 miles. Foremost in this area was the narrow-gauge East

Tennessee & Western North Carolina (Tweetsie) line. Built to service ore movements from Cranberry, North Carolina to a steel mill in Johnson City. It's smaller 36"-width size cars could not be sent forward on standard-gauged 54" track sizes, a feature which is modeled extensively at the museum in the Ken Marsh display hall. The museum's extensive model of this operation has been featured in nationally-distributed magazines and is considered the largest example in existence of it in this scale.

"This is a special event for us for a number of reasons," explains Geoff Stunkard, the coordinator of the museum's Heritage Days program. "We have committed a lot of time and development resources to our ET&WNC layout and have created a number of important industrial scenes on our other displays as well. We now have a true-scale model of the original Johnson City steel mill, and our G-gauge layout focuses on timber operations, another facet of our regional industries. The short-line idea fits this museum quite well."


THOUGHTS ABOUT MODEL RAILROADING WHILE SNOW-BIRDING IN FLORIDA SOME TENNESSEE HISTORY



"Nashville & Northwestern 5 foot gauge locomotive of 1862 built by Rogers. The N&NW is today's Bruceton Subdivision of CSX known to us as the "Windy". In 1862 it spanned from Nashville to Kingston Springs. It was extended by the Union Army during the war to Johnsonville, a supply depot on the Tennessee River."

UPDATE ON BUILDING A RAILROAD

Here's an update on my layout planning since the January issue of the SIGNAL BRIDGE.



When I left off discussing my track planning project I had talked about accessing the Tennessee State Comptrollers collection of Tax Valuation maps housed on the internet. They are recorded as .PDF files and can be printed to fit both 8.5x11, or 8.5x14 single sheets of paper or be printed full size on multiple sheets of paper. By cutting and pasting these sheets a final map measures approximately 3'x5' and can reveal significant detail. The tax maps are from the 1930's and have been marked up with the changes of property ownership, abandonments and the like.

Sanborn Fire Insurance maps are also useful. The Library of Congress has created a digital collection of




these maps and the data base can be search easily to find maps depicting many of Tennessee's communities (the maps for Washington County are fairly extensive and date from the 1890's). The Library of Conges files are in .GIF format and need to be run through a PhotoShop or PaintShop type program.

I searched many sites that had map repositories, including government web sites (State and County). Most of the "free" files I discovered were from the 1890's through the teens of the Twentieth Century. More current Sanborn Maps can be purchased but this can prove expensive.

Another source of information useful for track planning are Company track profile maps. Most railroad companies created profile map books. Each book would cover the right-of-way for a Division or sub-Division. These books contained a list of stations indexed to the mileposts along the track. The also show the track plan in 4 mile increments. Details shown include: elevation, % of grade, placement of curves, degree of curvature drainage and culverts, placement of company owned structures, bridges, and grade crossings. They also showed track layouts for yards and sidings (though these depictions were not always accurate).

A first attempt to try out the second trackplan with the rail sections I had at hand led to some changes in the receiving yard on the Tracy City branch. Now more resembling that track plan for the Bon Aire branch.



After laying out the track sections I had on hand I discovered I could enlarge the yard. I then close-fitted the track sections and transferred the track on to rolled out contractors' paper. I then outlined the track marking frogs and switch points and labeled the various tracks



I purchased several display racks from SEARS. They were used for over-range microwave displays. I had an inspirational moment in the store when I saw them.... "these can be repurposed for a moveable shelf layout!"

Coordinators' Reports:

- N-Scale; Gary Gilliam: We continue to need parts, the Atlas trucks that have been out of stock seeming across the county for many months now. 50 pairs are needed. Some track work is needed on the layout and Gary will order what he needs from Bob Barrett at HobbyTown USA
- Locomotive Repair; Gary Gilliam: All locomotives are in good repair and are operational.
- Heritage Day Event; Geoff Stunkard: The planned Heritage Day for February will be "Short lines and Industrial Railroads".
- Tweetsle Layout; David Doughty: The layout is operating well. We have not been "short-handed" for operators on Saturdays. Fred has added more scenery on the layout between Crabtree and Roan Mountain. A new HO-Scale Southern Steam locomotive has been purchased for the layout and a diamond-stack HOn3 2-8-0 has been added to the roster.
- HO-Layout; John Carter: The new Walters turntable has been delivered and Frank Fezzie will be installing the electronics and the new bridge very soon that will greatly improve the performance of the turntable. The old turntable pit will not have to be replaced saving a lot of work. New Lexan shields have been cut and put in place to protect the layout from the public. The sub-

- roadbed on the former Ramey modules has been constructed behind the column and several members have painted many of the rails and ties in the yard.
- Membership Coordinator; Rogert Sullivan: Robert has agreed to start a new effort to recognize our members by selecting a "Member of the Month" and writing a small column about that person and their interest in model railroading for inclusion in each issue of The Signal Bridge. Robert will make his selection with the suggestions of other club members.

John Carter reported that February's and March's program will be using the Static Grass applicator. We need to think about April and if anybody has ideas for workshops, or you have a particular film that you want to share with us? A video we can do that.

President's Report

Fred reported

The past five Saturdays we've had over 900 visitors during the 25 hours that we're open in those five Saturday. So a lot of people have been finding us. We had a big crowd of the last Saturday of December and has continued most Saturdays. We're getting more than a hundred people and twice we had over 200 people. We're getting good response and some of it was due to the publicity that went out in January when we helped Johnson City kick off their hundred fiftieth anniversary. Doing something special in the museum each time and that was being advertised in several places. So I'm sure that helped to turn out a lot of the people who have been coming to see us.

The industry building update. We talked a little bit last night at the Carter HRS chapter meeting, I don't have any more

information other than it's still on the president's mind because I attended the meeting a week ago last Friday with a committee that meets with him once a month of he was updating this group on things are happening around the University. I've had emails from Jenny Brock. Who's the Mayor Johnson City last week trying to set up a meeting with me and the subject line is relocation of the Carter Railroad Museum. I know that she and President Nolan have met at least once before they came out and whether they talked about the ash tree building or not. I don't know.

I have an appointment with vice-president Jeremy Ross. His dad is an architect in town. Jeremy has been a vice president here for reviewers and one of the hats that he wears is Chief Operating Officer, which means that under his purview are all the spaces on campus. Jeremy walked through the building with the president and I as well as several other people. We did go and take a look at the proposed off campus building. Jerry and the president went over and give me a heads up re: his present thinking President stated that all we need to do now is find the money. So to me, everything is positive at this point.

After this will be what happens in the Governor's address to the state on March 4th, the building that will replace will be where the Campus Center building is now where our museum is. If it's still on that on his budget and this feels from the top it's still there, a whole lot of gears will start turning. When I meet with vice president Ross discussion will be about that particular building. So as I get more information, I'll give you the information.

If you haven't been by the Ash Street building is easy to find just go down State of Franklin until you get to the old Tupelo Honey, then make a right and the next street is Ash street. The big building standing there on Left all by itself that says United States post office across the top of it is the ash tree building. It's about 6,000 square feet upstairs a little over 7,000 square feet on the first floor. And there's a full basement. So there's a there's a lot of possibilities in that Building and it looks like a museum. I think get the go-ahed. It take between three and four million dollars to seal the deal right now cost. It is estimated that it will that much for rough remodeling and to bring it up to code for ADA compliance (which includes an elevator on all three floors).

We have the discussion back before Christmas about not taking food into the galleries. A lot of folks who are sitting here right now are the regulars that are there every Saturday and you've been really great about moving the lunches and snacks into the workroom. It's made it a lot better for everybody. And I appreciate when you see somebody who's forgotten that you remind them.

OLD BUSINESS

Operating Session

We have an operating session the first Monday of every month. One of the central figures organizing this was Ted, but he is out of town. We need a minimum of 6 people to operate. We operate the layout as a prototype layout with time schedules for each train and with destinations for each. Trains have specific consists of cars for each. Club equipment is used... So you might not want to bring your own locomotive to test it out or run it. And the sessions get fairly intense if you your train is not where it's supposed to be. The session starts at about 5:30 pm. By 6 the sheets have been handed out. You've got your duties for the night and it usually takes about two hours to get through the whole schedule that has been laid out. So, the first Monday of the next first month is March 4th.

Train Show Committee

It was reported that the committee continues to prepare for the 2019 show registering vendors and distributing promotional flyers to regional shows. We need to get several people tasked with trying to get the tables we need and check where we got them in previous years and see if we can find other places as well. The National Model Railroad Association is having a meet in Chattanooga, the same weekend as us and some of the layouts we have had in the past will be at that event. So right now we've got two possibly three layout while in the past we have had five or six. Anyone who may have suggestions about club that you think we ought to contact in order to try to get additional layouts here.

Marketing what things that we've been doing, right but things can we improve on the in order to get more people through the door, having 400 youngsters that are coming in free which is not the problem because often they're coming with parents that will help them buy things but we're getting about a Thousand Eleven Hundred adults through Days, we've got vendors who like the venue they want to continue to come back but we have to try to do the best we can to generate as much publicity. So we get people coming through the doors down there. The vendors and we've got some marketing of expertise this year including the gentleman that was here last time named John Keats. Is a retired Professor who did marketing so he talked to some of the club members lifestyle. We're going to have another

meeting with him to see what we can do to improve things.
