<u>Big Train Show 2020</u>: We have new Big Train Show flyers printed featuring a locomotive and consist owned and operated by member *Logan Heaton* with the image also being used on the new roll-up banners on display in the museum and being taken to regional train show for distribution by Big Train Show coordinator, *Roger Teinert*, and many of our members. We are already getting good responses from potential vendors for the 2020 Big Train Show scheduled for June 5-6th. Many of us will continue to visit other train shows, talk to vendors and advertise our event in the 8 months leading up to our own 5th annual show in the ETSU Mini-Dome. If you are planning to attend a train show anywhere in the East please take some of our train show flyers with you to distribute and be sure to talk to vendors letting them know about our June show and ask them to come be a part of it.

2019 HOn3 Annual: This week *Geoff Stunkard* and I got the galley proofs for our illustrated article on our ET&WNC HOn3 layout from *George Riley*, Associate Editor, of the *HOn3 Annual*, 2019 Edition, published by White River Productions. The proofs lay out a nicely illustrated 9-page article on our layout titled, "Tweetsie Between Town" and focuses on the section of the layout just east of Blevins and Hopson where the Lacey store/ post office and the depot are located and stretching to the section just west of the town of Roan Mountain. The article discusses what you might do to make a layout more interesting and, in our case, more historically accurate, between the more major landmarks that are often enhanced on model railroads. Thus, we see the rockwork and scenery along Big Nance and Little Nance cuts, the little sidings that were commercially important, the remnants of a logging operation that reminds us of the importance of timber as a commodity transported by the narrow-gauge railroad, and the three homes and small country Methodist Church that comprised the small community along the tracks that was alternately called Crabtree or Crab Orchard.

There is excitement in carefully reading the galley proofs looking for errors and tweaking the text in a few places. The excitement comes from seeing, before the magazine goes on sale to model railroaders around the world, the words and photos that stem from the layout we have been creating for more than 7 years to pay homage to that long-gone little 3-foot narrow gauge railroad that began in Johnson City and penetrated the mountains into North Carolina bringing much of the outside world to the isolated people living in these forested hills and growing towns, industries and livelihoods along its route. There is great pride in knowing we have created, and continue to create, a miniature version of a little railroad that meant so much to the region we now call home, that none of us got to see in operation, and that a well-respected national/international magazine will publish a part of for the 6th consecutive year. My thanks to all who have worked on the layout, operated it for the public, told its story intertwined with that of the prototype, taken and posted photos and videos on social media, created the scenery and the structures, and talked and written about it. You have all helped to bring the memories of the "Railroad with a heart" back to 3-dimential life to the sounds of little locomotives pulling their short consists through stream -cut mountains covered by thousands of trees. You have helped to bring Tweetsie back to the world of railroaders in a way that is a tribute to your skills, your energy, your imagination and your hobby. Thank you.

The 2019 issue should be printed and on sale soon and, once more, the museum will order 50 copies with discounts to our members. Be sure to get your copy to go with the others you already have in your personal collection. Be sure to show you family and your friends the kind of work we are doing in our little railroad museum.

November Rail Excursion: The rail excursion on the Smoky Mountain Railroad, Bryson City, NC, co-hosted by the Carter Chapter NRHS and the Carter RR Museum was limited to 71 seats by the railroad company as they were selling tickets fast and would not hold more seats for us past October 2nd (a full month prior to our scheduled excursion). All of our allotted seats are taken and we thank any of you who are participating with us and supporting these educational public outreach events. Your participation is always sought and welcomed and we want you to join us on as many of these rail adventures as you can. Riding on the limited number of prototype trains that are available to us in a day's drive is always fun and we have a great time with the folks who join us, some for their first train ride ever. These events are also a terrific way to promote the MEMRR, the Carter Chapter NRHS, our railroad museum and we have recruited members from people we first met on these excursions. We will be planning 3 for next year in January when we establish our annual calendar of events. When we have the dates and locations set, please mark one or more on your calendar as a "must do" occasion and plan to come along with us.

2020 Museum Calendar: We really enjoyed publishing our very own calendar for the first time in 2019 with all the MEMRR, Carter Chapter NRHS and Carter RR Museum events on it as a great reminder of many of the things we plan to do for the year. We sold many of them and provided many to vendors and potential vendors for our annual Big Train Show. They were very well received and were great promotional pieces for our organizations, as well as just being useful. *Geoff Stunkard* has been collecting photographs from our layouts, in addition of prototype photos, to represent the hobby of model railroading, the real deal railroads, and our clubs and museum for the 2020 calendar. He has put the calendar together and in the first week of October we delivered it all to the ETSU University Relations office and on to the university print shop. We should have new calendars delivered for sale at the museum (discounted once more to members) by the end of this month. Be sure to get your copies and remember they make great gifts for friends, including stocking stuffers for the coming holidays. They provide another avenue of publicity for the museum and for our clubs.

This is the one scheduled time during the month when you can work with other club members to operate trains with time schedules and particular jobs to do while on the clock. Come join the fun with other members at the **next Operations Session on Monday, November 4th.** I hope to see you there.

Another month has gone by since you received your last club newsletter. Lots of things are happening at the museum and with our supporting clubs. Come be an active part of it and join in the fun and in the work of creating better and better layouts for our use and the public's pleasure. Listen to the sound of the whistle of the train in the night and dream of all the destinations yet to come.



George L Carter Railroad Museum and MEMMR

The many colorful multiple railroads of the Midwest are featured at the George L. Carter Railroad Museum, located in the Campus Center Building of East Tennessee State University. The region encompassing Chicago, Detroit, Louisville, Milwaukee and St. Louis was the true epicenter of American commerce between east and west during the 20th century. Literally dozens of railroads large and small provided service throughout Ohio, Indiana, Illinois, Kentucky and the upper midwestern states, all service as links to the chain.

Between passenger and freight operations, the railroad were crucially important in the era before widespread air travel and interstate highways. This was especially true during the 1st & 2nd World Wars. Whether it was perishables like produce and livestock or raw commodities such as coal and ore, everything from store goods to Studebakers came from this region. Since so many models of these trains remain popular, icons of streamlining and strength, it is planned to have excellent Midwestern representations in operation by volunteers on the museum's 24x44 foot HO scale layout. The Carter Railroad Museum is open on Saturdays from 10:00 AM to 3:00 PM, and includes model railroad layouts, a special child's activity room, and ongoing programs. There is no admission fee but donations are welcome for its upkeep. The museum is also seeking artifacts for display, including the newest addition dedicated to the long-defunct, but well-remembered 'Tweetsie' line, the East

In addition to the displays, there is also a growing research library, and an oral history archive being established as part of the museum's programs. Members of the George L. Carter Chapter of the National Railway Historical Society and the Mountain Empire Model Railroaders (MEMRR) club coordinate the exhibits. Membership opportunities are available to adults, and include special benefits and model railroading enjoyment.

The museum can be identified by a flashing railroad crossing signal at the back entrance to the Campus Center Building. Visitors should enter ETSU's campus from

State of Franklin Road (at green light) onto Jack Vest Drive and continue east to North Dossett Drive (then left) to John Roberts Bell Drive at end, then right then left on Ross Drive(176) to end, adjacent to the flashing RR crossing sign.
