## Minutes of MEMRR Monthly Meeting - 11/19/19

Meeting called to order at 6:32 PM by President Fred Alsop.

After welcoming remarks, Fred called for Officer Reports.

<u>Secretary's report</u>: John Carter reported for Gregg Mundkowsky because John took notes prior meeting: John reports that he misplaced the Oct. minutes but will rewrite from memory when he gets time.

<u>Newsletter editor</u>: Cathy Smith is not in attendance, Bill Smith reports the Nov. Signal Bridge is being worked on and articles and photos from members are always welcomed.

<u>Treasurers' report</u>: Gary Emmert reports we have money. He notifies all present that dues for next year (\$30) are now payable, and must be paid before Jan. 31st, 2020.

<u>Webmaster report</u>: Ben Merritt reports the website is up to date. He mentions that he does the online newsletter circulation and if anyone knows of members not receiving by email, please let him know. He informs us the Annual Picnic (Christmas Party) invites have been sent out also. Fred reminds us that this will be held on Dec. 13<sup>th</sup> at the Jonesborough Presbyterian Church at 6 PM. He invites anyone who would be willing to help with setup and decoration to arrive as early as 4 PM. He will put info regarding a optional gift exchange (Dirty Santa??) in his President's Letter.

<u>V.P. report</u>: John Carter says the 2020 schedule is pretty much complete except for possible group excursions. The schedule as known is noted in the 2020 calendars (yay!). John suggested we have 'hands-on' training sessions/ programs on Thursday evenings, and invited suggested topics.

<u>Presidents report</u>: Fred describes that 71 people went on the Bryson City train excursion in November. The number was a sell-out, limited by available seating on the Great Smoky Mountains Railroad tour in the Nantahala Gorge in NC. Fred said because of the attendance there was a financial surplus, a portion of which will be donated to the museum. Fred reports that he has had several meeting with people and groups interested in having the Ashe Street building retained and renovated. A coalition has been established seeking historic status for the structure, and a \$300K grant to perform roof repairs as a start. Fred reminded us there are 2020 calendars available.

<u>Old Business</u>: Fred reminded us the next operating session at 5 PM on December 2<sup>nd</sup>. Geoff Stunkard has drafted up a new timetable/ operating plan. Since staging is need for the session, using Club equipment, all private equipment must be cleared from the staging, sidings and freight yards. Discussion ensued – John Carter suggested we could start pre-staging for operations the Saturday before. Fred reminded all that personal cars should be marked with a unique paint color dot, according to a list kept by John Hoit.

We get about 2,000+ kids per year as visitors. Roger, Amy and Robert discussed control and head counts.

Election of 2020 Officers: Fred invited any nominations from the floor – there were none. Robert Sullivan (membership chairperson) read the slate of nominees. Since there were no contested positions, after discussion, Bill Smith made a motion to accept the slate as proposed, this was seconded by Paul Haynes. Fred called for a vote - the motion was passed unanimously by acclamation, the officers are elected. 2020 Officers are: President Fred Alsop; Vice-President John Carter; Treasurer Gary Emmert; Secretary Mike Tarter, Editor Cathy Smith, Webmaster Bill Smith, Associate Webmaster Ben Merritt.

## **Lose Track of Time!**

#### TRUE VINTAGE: Hot Out of Englewood, 1944-46

The four shots here are from a negative collection recently purchased by Geoff Stunkard showing the work of the late Jack Ryan. These were shot in what was an oft-restricted wartime era and are truly rare images for this location as a result. Englewood was on the southwest side of Chicago and quite unfortunately is now considered one of the most dangerous location. Back then, the NY-to-Chicago mainlines of the New York Central and the Pennsylvania Railroad joined from their respective depots downtown to make a side-by-dash into northern Indiana. Meanwhile, the Rock Island came in from the south, while passenger trains of the Nickel Plate, Monon, Wabash, Erie, C&O and other lines also made stops or passed through using their own tracks or those of the Chicago & Western Indiana. Of over 100 negatives in the collection, these images of fabulous name trains are special. Prints are 8.00 each.



The legendary Broadway Limited is behind two K4-class Pacifics getting underway in the late afternoon for New York City. Note the 20<sup>th</sup> Century Limited has already begun its departure in the background.

The Rock Island's legendary TA-series engine were built by EMD before the war began and are easily identified by the body design and the low-slung trucks. The Rockets operated here on a regular basis, coming in from the south to join the NYC/NKP line into the city and crossing the PRR and C&WI on a viaduct. Gary Emmitt knows this location well.



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## **Lose Track of Time!**

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This is the first-ever Niagara, 6000, waiting at the curved part of the Englewood platform to go east. It is a little later than the test era, as the elephant ear-like smoke deflectors are on it, but could well have been among the first revenue trips of the engine. Based on the baggage car, this might be the Fast Mail or it could be the Century with heavy front-end business.

A Nickel Plate Hudson pants in the smoky environs heading north as it makes one last stop before terminating downtown. This is one of the only images existent showing the Buy War Bonds tender which was painted on this single NKP locomotive for several months at the height of WWII.

## **George L Carter Railroad Museum and MEMMR**

The many colorful multiple railroads of the Midwest are featured at the George L. Carter Railroad Museum, located in the Campus Center Building of East Tennessee State University. The region encompassing Chicago, Detroit, Louisville, Milwaukee and St. Louis was the true epicenter of American commerce between east and west during the 20th century. Literally dozens of railroads large and small provided service throughout Ohio, Indiana, Illinois, Kentucky and the upper midwestern states, all service as links to the chain.

Between passenger and freight operations, the railroad were crucially important in the era before widespread air travel and interstate highways. This was especially true during the 1st & 2nd World Wars. Whether it was perishables like produce and livestock or raw commodities such as coal and ore, everything from store goods to Studebakers came from this region. Since so many models of these trains remain popular, icons of streamlining and strength, it is planned to have excellent Midwestern representations in operation by volunteers on the museum's 24x44 foot HO scale layout. The Carter Railroad Museum is open on Saturdays from 10:00 AM to 3:00 PM, and includes model railroad layouts, a special child's activity room, and ongoing programs. There is no admission fee but donations are welcome for its upkeep. The museum is also seeking artifacts for display, including the newest addition dedicated to the long-defunct, but well-remembered 'Tweetsie' line, the East

In addition to the displays, there is also a growing research library, and an oral history archive being established as part of the museum's programs. Members of the George L. Carter Chapter of the National Railway Historical Society and the Mountain Empire Model Railroaders (MEMRR) club coordinate the exhibits. Visit 'www.memrr.org' to learn more about MEMRR, or visit 'http://glcarternrhs.com/' to learn more about Carter Chapter, which helps demonstrate and maintain the model layouts, museum exhibits and other projects.

Membership opportunities are available to adults, and include special benefits and model railroading enjoyment.

The museum can be identified by a flashing railroad crossing signal at the back entrance to the Campus Center Building. Visitors should enter ETSU's campus from State of Franklin Road (at green light) onto Jack Vest Drive and continue east to North Dossett Drive (then left) to John Roberts Bell Drive at end, then right then left on Ross Drive(176) to end, adjacent to the flashing RR crossing sign.
