

<u>In the News:</u> The train exhibit including the interviews with folks who actually worked on the railroads that has been produced by *Sandra Laws*, library faculty, at ETSU's Sherrod Library continues to get more wide-spread attention. Due to COVID-19 we <u>will not</u> meet either night for a pre-meeting dining experience as we were accustomed to doing prior to March 2020.

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October Train-Boat Excursion: This trip, co-hosted by the G.L. Carter Chapter NRHS and the G.L. Carter Railroad Museum, is still a go to take place on Saturday, October 30th. Tickets are still available for purchase and information, ticket requests and waiver of liability forms can all be obtained at the Carter RR Museum or downloaded online at memrr. org and clicking on "Excursions", or from the ETSU homepage by going to Railroad Museum and scrolling down to "Events". This event includes round-trip from ETSU via modern air-conditioned, toilet-equipped buses, a train ride along the Tennessee River on the 3-Rivers Rambler RR, and a luncheon cruise on the Star of Knoxville paddle wheel boat on the Tennessee River. All of this for \$95 adults, \$85 for children 2-12 years of age. This is a great one-day trip, and we invite all of our members to join us for this fun adventure. We really would like for our members to help us fill the buses, the train and enjoy a delicious meal on the boat. Ticket sales end soon and spots on this trip are limited. Don't miss out. 41st National Narrow-Gauge Convention: Several of us attended this national 5-day convention of model railroaders in Hickory, NC the first week of September. The G.L. Carter Railroad Museum had a table at the vendors' arena in the Hickory Convention Center where Catherine and I passed out brochures for our clubs, the 2022 Big Train Show, and the museum and we talked to all of the vendors as well as many of the participants. Members Ben Merritt and Michael Sager shared a table where Mike gave great clinics showing folks how to make great trees, especially conifers, and Ben made sales of several of his 3-D printed cabooses. There were outstanding clinics to attend daily and vendors from all over the country. I submitted the ET&WNC models of the Coal Chut and the Johnson City depot in the "structures" division of the modeling contest. The Coal Chut took 3rd place based on the votes of the registered conventioneers and it also garnered a special prize "Southern Flavor" for the outstanding model picked by the directors of the modeling event. When our certificates and ribbons arrive, they will be displayed at the Carter Railroad Museum.

The day before the events began in Hickory for the convention, a tour of the old "Tweetsie" railroad line right-of-way was offered. Two busloads of participants followed the line westward from Boone, NC with stops at Newland, NC to see the refurbished Linville depot and the 505 ET&WNC caboose. They then traveled on to the Doe River Gorge where they had lunch and road the rails behind the rebuilt steam locomotive, "Crown" and transferred to smaller cars pulled by little locomotives all the way to Pardee Point, mile marker 17. The group ended their trip at the Carter Railroad Museum with 77 people arriving by bus and another 14 coming by private vehicles for a total of 91 visitors. As narrow-gaugers they were particularly interested in our HOn3 "Tweetsie" layout, but we got many compliments from them as they toured out entire museum. I wish to thank all of our members who came that Tuesday afternoon to open up the museum, operate our layouts, and greet our visitors from across the country. Our book sale of duplicate editions from the museum library was also a hit and we sold the group many volumes that we no longer needed.

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<u>Big Book Sale:</u> Our library book sale continues with many duplicate books still available for your personal library. You can come by the museum during Saturday open hours (10 AM to 3 PM) and choose from what is still available, or on a Thursday afternoon/evening workday to fine those books that you really want to read and own. **Members are getting discounted prices** and these books represent railroads and railroad history from across the nation as well as railroads in other countries. May a date to come by while the selection is still good. We have had a great response to these sale offerings since it began in late August. All of the proceeds, less TN sales taxes, go into the Carter Railroad Museum's foundation account to be used for the museum's specific needs.

2022 Big Annual Train Show: We have been sending out promotional materials and flyers for the June 2022 Annual Big Train Show for many months now. Additionally, members have been going to train shows and talking to vendors there and providing them with our train show flyers as well. A number of vendors have already booked their tables for this event. Our train show coordinator, *Roger Teinert*, will soon be scheduling monthly planning meetings for this show, one of the largest in the southeast. If you would like to be on the planning committee, or just attend its meetings, please let Roger know. This is a big event, and it requires the labor of a lot of our members to put it on, so your input and assistance are most welcome.

Marketing and Management Department at ETSU: Three MBA graduate students in this department in the ETSU College of Business have taken on a two-semester project as part of their graduate degree requirement to work with me (FJA) to create a business plan and a marketing plan for the "new" Carter Railroad Museum prior to our move to a new, larger location sometime in the coming 18 months. This is great news as it will lay a firm foundation for decision making by the university and other city and business entities as we plan our move from our present location into our new one. I'll keep you all posted as this project proceeds.

<u>Coordinator's Meeting:</u> A Coordinator's Meeting was held in room 235 of the Campus Center Building (a floor just above the museum floor) on Thursday, September 16th. A report of that meeting is to be found elsewhere in this newsletter.

Happenings Around the Railroad Museum:

MEMRR HO Layout. Frank Fezzie has agreed to take on the role of Interim Coordinator for the MEMRR Layout. This is to relieve our long-time coordinator in that position, John Carter, of these duties he has done so well for many years in order to allow him some additional "free-time" to concentrate on some other pressing issues. Thank you, John, for passing the torch to Frank for the next year. Frank will be the overall coordinator but plans to have various sections of the club-own portions of the layout worked on by volunteer member groups, each with a "foreman" to help oversee each of these modular section projects. Owners of individual modules will be asked to talk with Frank before making any significant changes to their modules, but don't require group guidance as do the club modules. The two largest projects on current club-owned modules are those near the entrance of the gallery, the "depot" section to the left of the lift bridge, and the "logging" section to the right of the lift bridge. Rick Mulholland has agreed to be the "foreman" working with John Carter and others on the "logging" modules. Geoff Stunkard has agreed to act as the "foreman" working with Gary Gilliam, Logan Heaton and others on the "depot" modules and the "city scape" that in adjacent to the diesel transfer station. Anyone interested in helping these small groups should only just make your desires known to either "foreman" or to the Layout Coordinator. We welcome your ideas, your interests and modeling skills, and your participation in this club effort. (continued on page 5)

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N-Scale Layout. Layout Coordinator, *Mike Tarter*, with help from *Jim Gorney*, *Ken Harmon* and others have continued to upgrade the scenery on this 22 x 11 foot layout. They are busy "defoliating" some of the hillsides removing very worn and dusty lichen shrubbery and poorly manufactured trees and replacing them with new, fresh, bright vegetation and with trees made inhouse. Some of the hillsides look like mudslides hit by the torrential rains that have been happening in the southeast, or by the fires in the west, but when they are "reseeded" they are going to be eye-popping in their new green foliage. In addition, new rock landscaping is being installed, complete with rock climbers, and other sections are being refurbished and upgraded as well. This, too, is a big project that will take many months to complete, and anyone interested in lending a hand is most welcome. Come any Thursday workday and join in the project.

G-Scale. Coordinator *Mike Baker* has had little to do to keep this layout up and running for the public other that minor maintenance on locomotives and rolling stock and keeping the tracks clean.

Hon3 Tweetsie Layout. Out "Electrical Guru", *Frank Fezzie*, has repaired some of the problems with a few of the turnouts and he has installed a miniature camera and 15-inch TV at the Elk Park section of the layout that allows viewers to see the front sides of the buildings in the business district and the train as it comes into the station. This is a great improvement to Elk Park as the view from trackside in the gallery is only from the back of these buildings.

New buildings continue to be added to Elk Park and the town is growing as the cardstock mock-up buildings that have occupied the town landscape for so long are being replaced by models representing the structures that were present in 1925 (some are still there in modified form). The team producing them has specific roles as follows: *Fred* produces the scale drawings of each structure based on historic photographs. Next, *Bill Smith* takes Fred's structure drawing and converts it into CAD software for the computer connected to the museum's laser knife. Then *Ben Merritt* uses the CAD software and with the laser knife cuts out the basic structures for walls, floors, and roof pieces from wood or plastic. The pieces are then returned to Fred who assembles them, paints them, and details each structure for final placement on the layout. Thus, Elk Park continues to grow. This is the same process that has been used to create all the structures that have been assembled on the layout with the exception of the few structures that were commercially available kits, and Shell Creek, that Fred cut out using an Exacto Knife before we purchased the laser knife from Micro-Mark.

Little Engineer's Playroom. Our Station Master, *Amy Merritt*, did yeoman's work for us in the beginning weeks of the ETSU fall semester when she interviewed numerous potential student workers for employment in our railroad museum. This in addition to manning our sales table, working with children in the playroom and greeting visitors at the door with thermometer in hand. She selected 7 student workers, the most we have ever had by far, and has integrated them into our museum family. Each will be outfitted with a yellow museum shirt with their name on it by the time you are reading this column. Please introduce yourself to them and make them feel at home. If you have a task they might help you with please ask Amy, their direct supervisor first, for permission to have them for a while.

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Carter Railroad Museum Library. Librarian, *Dean Small*, with a lot of help from colleague, *Wallace Shealy*, have spend many hours working in our library to integrate all of our newer holding into an orderly arrangement on our library shelves. Their work produced a number of duplicate books that they have been selling with the able assistance of *Gary Emmert* who has been willing to spend hours at the sales table in the hallway. Emeritus member, *Duane Swank*, has taken materials the museum purchased and converted the raw lumber into 3 beautiful additional, and much needed, shelves that he and I installed one recent Sunday morning. These shelves will provide the extra space needed for the reception of even more new books in our library that now boasts more than 2,400 volumes. These books, with few exceptions of reference and/or rare volumes, are available to members of both clubs for checkout when the librarian is present. Great Job Fellows!!!

There are a lot of exciting things happening at the G.L. Carter Railroad Museum and with the Mountain Empire Model Railroaders Club and the G.L. Carter Chapter NRHS. Come be a part of these many activities and lend us your time, your expertise, and your friendship. Listen to the sound of the whistle of the train in the night and dream of all the destinations yet to come!


Tweetsie Layout Update Hampton: Article and photographs by Logan Heaton


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


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The 2020 Hon3 Annual and 2021 All Aboard Calendars are Available Now!

George L. Carter Chapter of NRHS Monthly Business Meeting Minutes - 9/20/21

The George L. Carter Chapter NRHS met on Monday, September 20, 2021, at 6:30 in Room 131 of Brown Hall on the ETSU Campus. Attending the meeting were members Fred Alsop, John Dodge, Carolyn Gregg, and Roger Teinert and guests Ben and Amy Merritt. The meeting was called to order by President Fred Alsop, and the guests were welcomed.

Reports

- President Fred Alsop reported that three MBA students will be working out a business plan for the New Museum.
- 41 National Narrow-Gauge RR visitors went to Doe River Gorge to ride the train during their time in the East Tennessee area. Their convention was in Hickory, NC. Ninety-one visitors in all were in the Museum or involved in the field trip from Hickory by bus or car.
- The Beagans are moving from Jonesborough to Oregon, and Roger has been helping him clean out his garage. They located a box of Train Excursion materials that were given to Carolyn Gregg. There were also other materials that can be used at the Museum.
- Cathy Smith has been in Maryland recovering from some hip restoration surgery.
- Jim and Charlotte Pahris have been ill.
- Vice President Roger Teinert reported that he had traveled to the Simpsonville, SC train show and talked with the vendors who usually attend our show. He is getting the fliers out when possible.
- Treasurer John Dodge reported that the treasury was in good shape.
- Historian Carolyn Gregg reported that people who visit the museum like to brag about what they and their family remember/know about the railroads, but when asked to do an interview or bring photos, they suddenly don't know anything or have any photos. Fred delivered the green material to Carolyn to use for the "skirts" in the Tweetsie Room.

Old Business

Annual Train Show — Roger said that he already had 9 vendors with 17 tables paid for by one group. Fred has scheduled the Venue for the 2022 Show. Roger will plan to have a meeting next month at 5:30 in Room 131 before the Chapter meeting. Fred said that he hoped Geoff could get the calendars made in October so that the Train Show would be listed there. Then they can be sent out to the Vendors.

October 30 Rail/Boat Excursion — Carolyn reported only 21 people have registered and paid for the Excursion. The Train costs \$1800, and we have to pay half by September 30th. We need 51 to break even. All the material is on the website. Fred will be on TV two days before the deadline. That was the earliest that he could get. Carolyn will contact John and Fred on September 29th with the number of people who have registered at that time. Ben suggested putting it on Facebook. When Fred asked Ben if he could do it, he recommended Logan Heaton. It seems that people may be concerned about the safety of a bus/boat trip.

Coordinators Present: Frank FeFranzzie, Gary Emmert, and Fred Alsop

<u>N-Scale Layout – Mike Tarter</u> (in abstentia): Mike reported prior to the meeting that scenery work was continuing on the N-Scale Layout with focus on upgrading the rock formations and replacing the worn lichen scenery with newer foam materials for shrubbery and trees.

<u>RIP Rolling Stock – Jim Hoit</u> (in abstentia): Jim reported prior to the meeting that he continues to upgrade donated rollingstock with metal wheel sets and Kaydee-style couplers as well as bring the cars to proper weight. He needs no additional materials for his workbench at this time.

<u>Carter Museum Inventory/Donations – Gary Emmert:</u> Gary reported sales of donated cars and track over the past month. He also reported that the BIG BOOK SALE that is still underway to members and visitors is going very well. These are donated books that are duplicates of the ones already catalogued and on our library shelves. Sandra Laws, ETSU library faculty, reported the railroad interviews with Gary Emmert and others, are getting wider and wider circulation. The link to them was just published for members of the Carolina Clinchfield Society's *Jitterbug* edition Volume 8, Number 23.

<u>HO-Scale MEMRR Layout – Frank Fezzie</u> (museum electrical coordinator and interim HO coordinator): Frank made an extensive report with goals for the future and a new plan for member work organization for the club modules on the layout. (See his full report printed separately in this issue of the newsletter.)

<u>G.L. Carter Museum – Fred Alsop:</u> Three new additional shelves built by Duane Swank (emeritus member) where installed in the library by Fred and Duane to provide the requested additional book storage space required by the museum librarian. We had 91 visitors from the 41st National Narrow-Gauge Convention visit the Carter RR Museum on August 31. Several large donated display cabinets are going to be picked up by ETSU Facilities Management and transported to the museum storage areas in Valleybrook under the guidance of Gary Emmert.

G.L. Carter Railroad Museum & MEMRR Electrical Coordinator Report 9/16/21

Sold 3 type UT4 throttles for \$140. These are the single knob small throttles and have not been used by anyone for a long time. Members clearly prefer the DT402 / DT500 type throttles with two knobs.

Proceeds were used to;

Repair two DT402D throttles that have been out of service for some time.

Install new encoders in five DT402 throttles.

Install large knobs on 10 DT402 throttles and 4 DT500 throttles.

Currently MEMRR has one DT402R throttle, four DT402D throttles, and four DT500D throttles, for a total of nine throttles in service.

ET&WNC has five DT402D throttles in service.

Microsoft is preparing to release Windows 11. I do not expect either of the two computers on layouts to qualify for the upgrade due to performance or hardware issues. Windows 10 support is expected to continue for several years at least.

I am investigating possible use of a Raspberry Pie computer for layout operations. These are cheap (about \$100), small (about the size of two decks of cards), run Linux instead of Windows, and start up more quickly than our current units.

I am also evaluating the new Digitrax UT6D for museum use. This is a single knob throttle that replaced the UT4. It has the added abilities to operate turnouts and to MU engines into consists, both features that the UT4 could not do. The UT6D cannot be used for programming and has a simpler keyboard than the DT402D / DT500D throttles. This may help to prevent operators from getting into trouble. It has a larger display screen which should be a plus for our older eyes. The UT6D cord is completely removable which should eliminate issues with snagging the cord on the DT402D / DT500D throttles with various things including scenery.

- 1. Screen to block window at Elk Park
- 2. Repair track problem at turnouts 206 & 210 at Elk Park
- 3. Install 2nd camera at Elk Park and test positions for it
- 4. Install modified polycarbonate shield at Coal Dock to eliminate wood support in corner that is blocking view
- 5. Repair multiple stripped screws holding polycarbonate shields around layout
- 6. Install and test new modifications into brass 10-wheeler to improve operation and reliability
- 7. Repair vertical kink in track at base of grade down into Cranberry tail track so that engines do not hang up and slip.

George L Carter Railroad Museum and MEMMR

The many colorful multiple railroads of the Midwest are featured at the George L. Carter Railroad Museum, located in the Campus Center Building of East Tennessee State University. The region encompassing Chicago, Detroit, Louisville, Milwaukee and St. Louis was the true epicenter of American commerce between east and west during the 20th century. Literally dozens of railroads large and small provided service throughout Ohio, Indiana, Illinois, Kentucky and the upper midwestern states, all service as links to the chain.

Between passenger and freight operations, the railroad were crucially important in the era before widespread air travel and interstate highways. This was especially true during the 1st & 2nd World Wars. Whether it was perishables like produce and livestock or raw commodities such as coal and ore, everything from store goods to Studebakers came from this region. Since so many models of these trains remain popular, icons of streamlining and strength, it is planned to have excellent Midwestern representations in operation by volunteers on the museum's 24x44 foot HO scale layout. The Carter Railroad Museum is open on Saturdays from 10:00 AM to 3:00 PM, and includes model railroad layouts, a special child's activity room, and ongoing programs. There is no admission fee but donations are welcome for its upkeep. The museum is also seeking artifacts for display, including the newest addition dedicated to the long-defunct, but well-remembered 'Tweetsie' line, the East

In addition to the displays, there is also a growing research library, and an oral history archive being established as part of the museum's programs. Membership opportunities are available to adults, and include special benefits and model railroading enjoyment.

The museum can be identified by a flashing railroad crossing signal at the back entrance to the Campus Center Building. Visitors should enter ETSU's campus from State of Franklin Road (at green light) onto Jack Vest Drive and continue east to North Dossett Drive (then left) to John Roberts Bell Drive at end, then right then left on Ross Drive(176) to end, adjacent to the flashing RR crossing sign.
