There are lots of events happening in the coming months as we close out 2021 as you will see in the text below. If you haven't been to the Carter Railroad Museum in a while you need to come in on a Thursday evening or when we are open to the public on Saturdays and see all the changes that your fellow members have been making on all the layouts.

Monthly Meetings: The COVID-19 virus shut down the G.L. Carter Railroad Museum for several months in 2020 and also cancelled all of our in-person club/chapter meetings, and all of our planned social events as well as our museum and Carter Chapter NRHS co-hosted rail excursions. But as soon as it was safe to do so we reopened the railroad museum to our members, and later to the public in August of 2020. We also resumed our monthly meetings initially as joint meetings with both the MEMRR and the Carter Chapter NRHS using zoom meeting technology so we could be in the safety and comfort of our homes and still carry out the necessary functions of both of our organizations. For the past few months we have been holding separate monthly business meetings in a hybrid manner with simultaneous in-person and zoom meeting formats that allow members to choose between meeting in-person in a meeting room on the campus of East Tennessee State University or to continue to use the zoom technology to attend these meeting from off campus. This attempt to continue our meetings as scheduled monthly has had the positive effect of letting us conduct the business of our organizations, but with a steep falloff in attendance. Some members who were regular in attendance at each monthly meeting pre-COVID are no longer attending our meetings either in-person or via zoom. This is not a healthy situation for either club as these monthly meetings are important vehicles for conducting the important business that each organization needs to handle with their voices on motions, activities, problems and concerns, etc., that are better attended to when we have a quorum of members engaged in every decision. Your officers continue to do all that is required of them, and often times more, to keep each club functioning as their duties require them to do, but we all need your help, your support, and your voice at our monthly business meetings. Please make every effort to put these scheduled meetings back on your calendar and attend as many of them as you can. We depend on your voice to help us make each organization as efficient and responsible as possible. Please do your part and attend the meetings. The November meeting for the MEMRR is on November 16, 6:30 p.m. in ETSU's Brown Hall, room 223. We hope to see you at the November meeting!

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Officer Elections: November is the month when we elect our officers for the coming year in both the Mountain Empire Model Railroader club and the George L. Carter Chapter NRHS. These elections are important because you are entrusting your elected officers to be responsible for the open communication and the welfare of each of these organizations for the coming year. Your officers organize and conduct our meetings, plan and execute our social events and rail excursions, collect and protect your dues, edit and publish your monthly newsletter, trouble-shoot problems and concerns as they arise, and much, much more. They assume the responsibility for keeping the organizations organized. We owe them a lot of gratitude for all the extra work they do on a regular weekly basis to keep us viable in all ways.

We need 2-3 members in each club to act as a nominating committee to provide us with a slate of offices for consideration at our November meetings. Hopefully, most, if not all, of our current officers will be willing to serve again in their positions for another year, but any member in good standing who desires to be considered as a candidate for any club/chapter position is welcome to make your willingness to serve as an officer known and to be placed on a ballot for election. Ballots with candidates for all elected positions will be circulated via email to all active members in November and the results of the elections for both clubs will be announced ASAP following the voting deadline.

My thanks to all of our current officers, both elected and appointed, in the MEMRR and the Carter Chapter NRHS. You have been an outstanding group of officers to work with and each of you have served our organizations well with you due diligence and the faithful execution of your duties this year. Thank you for a job well done in a year when almost nothing has been "normal".

Rail & Sail Excursion: Our first rail excursion since October 2019 because of COVID is a sell-out!! We have filled three (3) 56-passenger buses for the trip to Knoxville on October 30th wit 168 participants who are eager to ride a train and have a luncheon cruise on the Tennessee River. We had to turn down applicants for the trip because we had filled all of the available spaces on the train and the boat, the paddle-wheel ship, *The Star of Knoxville*. A BIG THANK YOU!! to all our members who worked so hard to make this possible and to make it successful. A special thanks to *Carolyn Gregg* who has handled all the correspondence with our participants and assembled the logs for each bus, and to *John Dodge* who made all the reservations for the train and the boat. I helped with bus reservations through the university and with some television appearances on WJHL and WCYB. It has been a most successful team effort.

In January we will plan our 2022 rail excursion schedule with several excursions taking place over the year. These are inexpensive rail adventures that are family oriented. Almost all of them are day trips with early morning departures on modern comfortable buses furnished by Premier Transportation. If you have never come along on one of these with us, please plan to do so in 2022. If you have traveled with us before, plan to make another trip with us in 2022 and tell all your friends about it to help us fill our buses each time. All profits from these co-sponsored excursions are split between the Carter Chapter NRHS and the Carter RR Museum. The Carter Chapter uses some of its funds to send a high school student (usually one of our young members) to the National NRHS RailCamp in Dover, Delaware in June providing a great week-long experience for them. The Carter RR Museum uses its funding for many needs of the museum. Your expenses for the excursion go right back into our NRHS chapter and the museum once our vendors' bills are paid. Please plan to join us on an exciting rail excursion in 2022. (continued on page 4)

For the past 4 years he has created each annual museum calendar setting up each month with events and a railroad photo. In addition to selling these calendars to members and the public, we send each potential vendor for the Annual Big Train Show a calendar along with their vendor application forms to promote the train show. For the past 8 years, Geoff has written the text, submitted the photos taken by him and other members, to the national/international publisher, White River Productions, for the articles that have been featured in the HOn3 Annual or our ET&WNC RR layout. Roger Teinert, Gary Emmert and other members have gone to countless train shows promoting our Annual BIG Train Show and their efforts have been instrumental in making it become one of the largest train shows in the southeast. We are on the map because of the great publicity our members continue to provide for all of our events and for us. Thank you everyone for the outstanding work you do for the clubs and the museum.

New Publications: The 2021 Edition of the *HOn3 Annual* is coming off of the presses at White River Productions and I have 50 copies ordered for the Carter Railroad Museum for our members. 

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
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The 2020 Hon3 Annual and 2021 All Aboard Calendars are Still Available!

Many may have noticed in our previous update that the double store was just the first part of the overall structure. The building even to this day also had a large metal storage building which is connected by an overhead bridge that goes over the road making it easier and safer to move items back and forth between the buildings making it a unique sight to see in town. Currently Dr. Alsop is finishing up on the bridge while also putting the walls up on the storage building which once that is done will be covered with metal and weathered. 

The two additional buildings for the double store have been completed and ready for positioning. After completing the roofing on the two buildings with tarpaper being placed over the bridge section and metal roofing for the storage building the two buildings have now been weathered and placed out on the layout. For now the structures remain unattached from the shop so some landscaping can be done and set up some supports to where the building and bridge will sit right with the main shop. While waiting on the area to finish to complete the full assembly on the Double Store the next building for Elk Park is currently underway. The next building on the workbench will be the General Blacksmith Shop which was cut out earlier at our laser cutter under the watchful eyes of Ben Merritt. With the building now cut to the measurements Dr. Fred Alsop has moved the pieces over to the paint both to primer the pieces before starting on assembly. Stay tuned for more updates!

Steady progress has been made with the General Blacksmith Store. After the walls were primed the old wood layer is applied to the base along with some weathering and lettering applied to the walls. Some windows have also been installed already and the doors have been cut to mount when the building begins on final assembly. Stay tuned for more updates!!

Work continues on the General Blacksmith Shop as Dr. Fred Alsop has now finished supporting the walls and now beginning the assembly process. It doesn't take long to get the walls up and glued in together waiting to dry. While the walls settle the floor is also cut out for installation. After sanding down the edges and some final cuts the floor is put in fitting snug between the walls perfectly. The next step while the walls and floor settle will begin assembly on the roof getting it ready for installation on the rest of the

George L Carter Railroad Museum and MEMMR

The many colorful multiple railroads of the Midwest are featured at the George L. Carter Railroad Museum, located in the Campus Center Building of East Tennessee State University. The region encompassing Chicago, Detroit, Louisville, Milwaukee and St. Louis was the true epicenter of American commerce between east and west during the 20th century. Literally dozens of railroads large and small provided service throughout Ohio, Indiana, Illinois, Kentucky and the upper midwestern states, all service as links to the chain.

Between passenger and freight operations, the railroad were crucially important in the era before widespread air travel and interstate highways. This was especially true during the 1st & 2nd World Wars. Whether it was perishables like produce and livestock or raw commodities such as coal and ore, everything from store goods to Studebakers came from this region. Since so many models of these trains remain popular, icons of streamlining and strength, it is planned to have excellent Midwestern representations in operation by volunteers on the museum's 24x44 foot HO scale layout. The Carter Railroad Museum is open on Saturdays from 10:00 AM to 3:00 PM, and includes model railroad layouts, a special child's activity room, and ongoing programs. There is no admission fee but donations are welcome for its upkeep. The museum is also seeking artifacts for display, including the newest addition dedicated to the long-defunct, but well-remembered 'Tweetsie' line, the East

In addition to the displays, there is also a growing research library, and an oral history archive being established as part of the museum's programs. Members of the George L. Carter Chapter of the National Railway Historical Society and the Mountain Empire Model Railroaders (MEMRR) club coordinate the exhibits. Visit 'www.memrr.org' to learn more about MEMRR, or visit 'http://glcarternrhs.com/' to learn more about Carter Chapter, which helps demonstrate and maintain the model layouts, museum exhibits and other projects.

Membership opportunities are available to adults, and include special benefits and model railroading enjoyment.

The museum can be identified by a flashing railroad crossing signal at the back entrance to the Campus Center Building. Visitors should enter ETSU's campus from State of Franklin Road (at green light) onto Jack Vest Drive and continue east to North Dossett Drive (then left) to John Roberts Bell Drive at end, then right then left on Ross Drive(176) to end, adjacent to the flashing RR crossing sign.
