We are busily planning our Annual Big Train Show after a two-year hiatus because of

Covid in 2020 and major remodeling by the university of the Mini-Dome in 2021 that is our show venue. We are hopefully getting a grip on this global pandemic that will allow all of us to resume more closely what was our "normal" lives before we had to begin wearing masks, social distancing, and protecting ourselves and others with new vaccines. Our memberships in our clubs have remained strong, most have renewed their memberships, we have elected officers for the year, and we still have good attendance each Saturday at the Carter RR Museum of visitors and members, and our student workers are back. This should be a very good year for model railroading!

I wish to send a special "Thank you" to all of you who participated in my surprise birthday party at the Carter Railroad Museum on January 8^{th,} and to those who sent their congratulations (or sympathies) to me commemorating the personal milestone of my 80th birthday. Your remembrance, assisted by my wife, *Catherine, Amy Merritt*, and others was a wonderful event and one I shall not soon forget. We have some of the best guys and gals in our railroad clubs one could ever hope to work and socialize with, and I always look forward to your company. Thank you for the party and for all you do for the hobby, our clubs, and the railroad museum.

Membership Renewals: We continue to gain new members in our railroad clubs, and we welcome them as they bring new ideas, expertise, and energy to our organizations and the railroad museum. We have sent out numerous reminders to the membership since November 2021 that this is the window of time to renew your membership for the coming year in the Mountain Empire Model Railroaders or the G.L. Carter Chapter NRHS, or both clubs. On January 31 that window closes and if you have not renewed your membership, you will lose all your former club privileges, i.e., no access to the Carter RR Museum club layouts, no monthly newsletters, no voting privileges at club meetings, etc. etc. We don't want to lose you. PLEASE RENEW YOUR MEMBERSHIP NOW! JANUARY 31, 2022 IS THE DEADLINE!. Contact the MEMRR treasurer, *Mike Tarter*, or the G.L. Carter NRHS treasurer, *John Dodge*, and renew your membership for 2022. The code on the exterior door lockbox will be changed on January 31 and the new code will only be provided to paid-up members as is our policy.

ETSU and COVID Policy: Tennessee State Law prevents the university from protecting students, faculty, and staff from covid through the mandating of mask wearing. The university begins its Spring 2022 Semester with in-person classes issuing guidelines for everyone's safety hoping we can control exposure to the virus in all of its variants by asking its population to practice safe social contact without being able to mandate any of these safeguards. The University President, *Brian Noland*, has sent public notices to everyone on the ETSU campus asking us to practice social distancing, asking us to continue to wear **masks**

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masks in indoor settings, and asking everyone to get the free vaccines and the booster when you are qualified to do so. By law, we cannot mandate any of these safeguards, nor can we ask anyone if they are, indeed, vaccinated. Please be safe and try to safeguard the health of others as well as yourself, by continuing to practice these CDC guidelines. We will continue to take everyone's temperature at the museum door, and we will have a supply of masks available if you desire one. **Stay safe, please!**

<u>Club Meetings in 2022</u>: As long as COVID-19 continues to be a problem for us I will continue to have hybrid business meetings, zoom so you can attend from wherever you have a Wi-Fi or internet connection, and in-person for those of you who want to attend and interact in that fashion. Meetings will continue to be on the 3rd Monday of the month for the Carter Chapter NRHS and on the 3rd Tuesday of the month for the MEMRR. Both clubs will continue to meet at 6:30 p.m. with the Carter Chapter meetings in room 131 Brown Hall (a new designated meeting place because of university class scheduling) and the MEMRR will continue to meet in room 223 Brown Hall on the ETSU campus.

Joint Newsletter: Our newsletter Editor, *Cathy Smith*, will continue to edit and publish our joint newsletter combining information from both the MEMRR and the Carter Chapter NRHS into one excellent publication. We will continue to provide it to all members with email connections via the internet as an electronic copy and post it on the MEMRR website. We will continue to send it to members without computer/smartphone capabilities as a mailed hardcopy if they pay the postage fees. The newsletter always contains a lot of great current information including progress and changes made on the museum layouts, updates on organization-al news, rail excursions and social gatherings, minutes from our monthly business meets, how-to-do-it articles and modeling tips, and many other interesting topics. Our editor does a terrific job for all of us with the publication of this monthly newsletter. Please help your editor by submitting photos of models and the prototype railroad with informative captions, articles about your home layout, modeling tips, railroad trips you have taken, and any other modeling or prototype information. Every editor depends on gris for their publications and your contributions are always welcomed.

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The 2021 Edition of *The HOn3 Annual* arrived just before Christmas, and we have copies for sale at the museum's sales table. The ET&WNC "Tweetsie" layout is featured for the 7th consecutive year in this collector's edition with 8 color-illustrated pages. This edition features the "feeding of the Tweetsie's iron horses" with text and illustrations of the coal, water, and sand facilities provided along the line to keep the little narrow-gauge locomotives running under steam power. It is a strong tribute to the quality of workmanship demonstrated in our little railroad museum to have this layout published annually for many years now in a publication that has national and international distribution and readership. This is the kind of publicity that brought more than 90 participants in the 41st Annual Narrow Gauge Convention meeting in Hickory, NC to our museum in late August 2021. These visitors represented model railroaders from across North America who had read about the ET&WNC Railroad and wanted to see our layout representing it in our museum in Johnson City where the "little railroad with a heart" originated. We have plenty of copies on hand now, so get your copy at a 20% discount from the retail price. It is packed with many excellent articles and modeling tips in addition to our 8-page article. I know you will enjoy it and please show it to your friends and encourage them to come to the Carter Railroad Museum to see the entire layout for themselves, as well as all our excellent model railroad layouts and exhibits.

ET&WNC RR Historical Society 2022 Convention: This historical society dedicated to preserving the memory of the ET&WNC Railroad will hold its annual convention based at the Carnegie Hotel, Johnson City, TN over the Memorial Day weekend, May 27-29, 2022. Like many other organizations, COVID-19 prevented the society from holding its conventions for the past two years, but plans are well underway for this year. This society is affiliated with the G.L. Carter Railroad Museum and in past years they have scheduled their convention to coincide with our Annual Big Train Show but have decided this year to meet one week earlier. This is a win-win for us as many of us tried to divide our time on a very busy schedule between our train show, having the railroad museum open for extra hours, and attending some of the varied events at the ET&WNC HS convention. The convention events include several small operating sessions on our Tweetsie layout as part of the activities for their attendees. We will work with them to provide operating instructions with the able assistance of the coordinators for our HOn3/ HO-scale layout. I would encourage any of you who may be interested in attending their convention to check out their website and become members. The cost is \$30 annual membership and includes quarterly magazines about the railroad and regular newsletters to members. Their convention includes several meals, rides on the Tweetsie Railroad in Blowing Rock, NC behind ET&WNC locomotive #12 after hours with the convention attendees only on board, and a ride up the Doe River Gorge on some of the original railbed during the 3-day convention. I'll provide more information and their convention program and plans come together later this spring.

2022 Annual Big Train Show: *Roger Teinert*, coordinator for the Annual Big Train Show, has his planning committee meeting on a regular basis as we enter the new year. The venue at the ETSU Mini-Dome has been contracted for, initial information and application forms have been sent out to former and potential vendors, and some have already responded with checks reserving tables for the event. Following a 2-year absence because of Covid and lack of access to the venue, we are planning for the largest show ever. The current meetings are being held in ETSU's Brown Hall room 131 on the 3rd Monday of each month at 5:30 p.m. Please plan to attend these open meetings if you are interested to learn what is being planned. Membership on the committee is welcomed and we will once again be calling on a lot of our members in both clubs to help us with the production and logistics of this big annual event that is hosted by the George L. Carter Railroad Museum. More detailed information and requests for assistance will be forthcoming.

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<u>2022 Rail Excursions and Social Events:</u> We will use the January club business meetings to plan the proposed rail excursions and social events for the MEMRR, Carter Chapter NRHS and the G.L. Carter Railroad Museum as we have traditionally done. Look for a possibility of 3 rail excursions in 2022, one of them being over the Labor Day Weekend as a 3-day event. If the current pandemic allows we will resume our annual social events of a Spring Fling, Late Summer Picnic, and Christmas Party.

National NRHS RailCamp: The NRHS cancelled its annual East and West RailCamps again in 2021 because of COVID-19, and we don't yet know if they will resume in 2022. If we get the green light that the camps will be conducted the Carter Chapter NRHS will once again sponsor a teenager to attend the East RailCamp in Delaware. If you have youngsters who are interested in being nominated for this great week-long adventure, please let me know so they may be considered. The chapter pays the attendee's roundtrip airfare from Tri-Cities airport and the entire tuition costs for the camp. We will need applications very soon, probably in a few weeks in order to have our applicant considered. We give priority to youth members in the MEMRR, but we can support non-club members.

News Around the Railroad Museum: All of our coordinators report progress on all of the layout exhibits in the Alsop and Marsh Galleries and well as in the museum library.

- N-Scale layout is seeing new vegetation replacing the old and deteriorating lichen trees, bushes and ground cover as well as new rock formations to upgrade the scenery on this big N-Scale layout. G-Scale is reported to be operating in good order without problems.
- HO-Scale MEMRR layout has some work being done on personal modules, but the major improvements are focused on the mountain logging scenes on the corner modules near the gallery entrance. Work seems to have slowed on the club modules that involve the depot and highway overpass areas.
- ET&WNC HOn3/HO-Scale layout work has been focused on the little railroad mountain town of Elk Park, NC. All but one of the scratch-built building have been completed on that part of the layout, with landscaping almost completed with roads, ground cover, trees, and with details being added to the buildings. It is now 85% completed.
- The museum library will soon reestablish cooperative work with the ETSU Library to bar-code and better catalog/index the library holdings. This will allow better service to those who wish to check out library holdings.

The New Year of 2022 is here, and it is filled with potential and new opportunities for the MEMRR, the G.L. Carter Chapter NRHS, and the George L. Carter Railroad Museum. We will strive to take full advantage of these as we move forward. Hear the sound of the whistle of the train in the night and dream of all the destinations yet to come. Happy New Year!!!



Members Present (on Zoom call): Fred Alsop, Mike Tarter, Ben Merritt, John Dodge

Fred called for Officer Reports.

<u>V.P. report</u>: Roger Teinert: Roger is unable to join the meeting

<u>Secretary's report</u>: The interim Secretary, Mike Tarter, noted that he had no report since there was no December meeting. The November meeting minutes were included in the December Signal Bridge and Coal Road.

George L Carter Railroad Museum and MEMMR

The many colorful multiple railroads of the Midwest are featured at the George L. Carter Railroad Museum, located in the Campus Center Building of East Tennessee State University. The region encompassing Chicago, Detroit, Louisville, Milwaukee and St. Louis was the true epicenter of American commerce between east and west during the 20th century. Literally dozens of railroads large and small provided service throughout Ohio, Indiana, Illinois, Kentucky and the upper midwestern states, all service as links to the chain.

Between passenger and freight operations, the railroad were crucially important in the era before widespread air travel and interstate highways. This was especially true during the 1st & 2nd World Wars. Whether it was perishables like produce and livestock or raw commodities such as coal and ore, everything from store goods to Studebakers came from this region. Since so many models of these trains remain popular, icons of streamlining and strength, it is planned to have excellent Midwestern representations in operation by volunteers on the museum's 24x44 foot HO scale layout. The Carter Railroad Museum is open on Saturdays from 10:00 AM to 3:00 PM, and includes model railroad layouts, a special child's activity room, and ongoing programs. There is no admission fee but donations are welcome for its upkeep. The museum is also seeking artifacts for display, including the newest addition dedicated to the long-defunct, but well-remembered 'Tweetsie' line, the East

In addition to the displays, there is also a growing research library, and an oral history archive being established as part of the museum's programs. The museum can be identified by a flashing railroad crossing signal at the back entrance to the Campus Center Building. Visitors should enter ETSU's campus from State of Franklin Road (at green light) onto Jack Vest Drive and continue east to North Dossett Drive (then left) to John Roberts Bell Drive at end, then right then left on Ross Drive(176) to end, adjacent to the flashing RR crossing sign.
