## The View from the Engineer's Side of the Cab & The Drawbar



It's February and Punxsutawney Phil—that Seer of Seers, Sage of Sages, Weather Prognosticator Extraordinary—emerged from his burrow (with a little help from his handlers) to make his much-anticipated forecast. He did reportedly see his shadow predicting 6 more weeks of winter, but here in our part of Tennessee we have gone from well below freezing to 80 F degree weather today. From snow to blooming flowers and back again. It's grand to have a hobby that can be practiced in the indoors such as model railroading or curling up with a good model rail-

road or train magazine. If you have not yet obtained your copy of the 2022 edition of the *HOn3 Annual* you need to purchase one from our sales table at the member's reduced price of \$22 and not only read our article about the Elk Park section of our "Tweetsie" layout, but also Johnny Graybeal's article on some of the ET&WNC locomotives, plus a lot of other outstanding articles in this collector's edition annual magazine. And, for those of you who are having troubles keeping up with club meeting dates, we still have a supply of our **museum's 2023 calendars** with all of those dates and the year's Heritage Day events clearly marked.

G.L. Carter Railroad Museum: Our museum home on the ETSU campus for the past 15 years will soon have to be on the move. After months of searching for a new home for us, with the help of Johnson City Commissioner, Jenny Brock, we now have a suitable building that we are working to complete the paperwork on to secure a lease agreement. The building is the Taylor Building at 207 N. Boone Street, in Johnson City. It is a stand-along building with an excellent location, more than 100 parking spaces, and very near one of the city's new public parks. If we can secure the location with a joint agreement between ETSU and Johnson City, we will have approximately 2,000 sq.ft. more floor space than we currently have in an almost ready-tomove-into facility that would need minimum remodeling. If we can make this happen as an origin bridge between the university and Johnson City who own both of their beginnings to railroads and railroad tycoons, we will be moving in a few months. A note of caution: Until, and When, this becomes a finalized agreement, please don't go into the building identifying yourself as a member of the railroad museum, or a railroad club member!! At such time as we have a signed contract in hand I will arrange a tour for everyone who wants to take a look at the inside of the building. For now, please drive around it to see where we hope to be, but don't go inside as it is still an operating business and we don't need to bother our potential future landlord. So, the future looks bright but I still have to negotiate a deal between university and city administrators. At this date I still have no firm date from ETSU as to when all occupants (including our museum) have to be out of the Campus Center Building, but rumor has it as sometime this summer, perhaps late June or July. The building is slated to be demolished in early fall 2023.

**Packing for the Big Move:** We have begun to use Thursday evening work sessions as a time to begin packing those articles from around the museum that are not often used and can easily be placed in temporary storage anticipating our move later in the year. On the MEMRR side, *Coordinator, Bob Grygotis,* has been organizing some of these work/pick-up/pack-up sessions. If you have personal items that you are not often using that are stored in the museum, perhaps under the layouts, please consider taking them home as one less thing to move later on. If you have good boxes that can be used for packing please bring them to the museum and we will put them to good use. In addition to removing items that are stored under all of the museum's layouts, some of the first rooms that we can concentrate on for packing a lot of smaller items (but perhaps not all as yet) are as follows: The Alsop Gallery workroom, the shelves in the office/work space that Alsop uses, the big 108 workroom, the storage room in 236. These will constitute a very good start. Boxes, packing tubs, and elbow grease needed!

**Spring Fling:** MEMRR Vice-President John Carter has secured the Black Olive Restaurant in Elizabethton, TN as the site for our Spring Fling (you will remember this as the site for the recent Carter RR Museum's Christmas Holiday Party). This restaurant was voted on unanimously by the MEMRR members at the February 21 monthly business meeting. This will be our first social event of 2023 and will be held on **Thursday, March 30, from 6:00-8:30 PM.** Please mark your calendar and plan to bring your spouse or significant-other for an evening of good food and outstanding company (no children please!). As always, the meal is Dutch treat.

**Spring Rail Excursion in the Planning Stages:** The Carter Chapter NRHS is working on the details needed to schedule their first public rail excursion for the 2023 season. The plan is to bus to Knoxville and ride the 3-Rivers Rambler Railway from the west side of the city up to the forks of the river where the Tennessee River has its origin on the east side of the city. The train on its return trip drops us at the dock of the Tennessee Riverboat Company for a luncheon cruise on the same river. The Saturday dates we are trying to secure are either April 29 or May 13 (the gap spans ETSU's final exam and graduation period). The riverboat company can give us either date, but the railroad is still having some maintenance issues with some of its locomotives and at this time is still unable to confirm a date in their spring schedule. When we get a firm commitment from the railroad we will set up the excursion and begin an advertising campaign to fill it up. As our roving reporter, *Logan Heaton* advises, "stay tuned".

<u>Annual Big Train Show:</u> *Roger Teinert*, Coordinator for the Annual Big Train show and many of his volunteers are hard at work planning for this year's event to be held Friday and Saturday, 2-3 June. Any members traveling to area train shows over the next few months are asked to take some of our train show flyers and vendor application forms (available at the Carter RR Museum, or from Roger, to the shows with you for distribution. Please talk to the vendors about coming to the show as well. Many of those who you converse with will already have been to our show in the past, or may be aware of it, but please engage them in conversation and tell them about our outstanding venue and services. **On the local front**, <u>we need lots of tables</u>, more than 300 8-foot tables, so if you know any places that may lend them to use for few days please let Roger or another committee member know. Committee meetings are held the 3<sup>rd</sup> Tuesday of the month (just before the MEMRR meetings) at 5:00 PM at Portobellos Restaurant on west State of Franklin (Kroger Shopping Center) and everyone is welcome to dine with us and join in the planning discussions.

**Possible Re-Publication of the G.L. Carter Biography:** A definitive biography of **George L. Carter** as the last great entrepreneur was written by two ETSU employees, **Ned Erwin** and **Ray Stahl**. A 1,000 copies were published by the ETSU Press in 2012, and 6 years after Dr. Stahl's death. It has never been reprinted and our museum has some of the very few remaining unsold copies. **Fred** met with **Dr. Ron Roach**, chairman of the Department of Appalachian Studies, ETSU, and **Ned Erwin** on February 17 to discuss the possibility of reprinting the book as a second edition. The author welcomed to opportunity to begin to plan this opportunity as something he had long wanted to do, but was financially unable to accomplish. I am beginning the exploration of the costs of such an endeavor as, both Dr. Roach and I would like to have copies available for sale. The digital files of the first printing are still available at ETSU and this would make the shared cost much less. I will keep you posted as we find out more information. On a similar note, I recently

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spoke to *Sheri Lewis*, the manager/owner of **The Overmountain Press**, who published *The Blue Ridge Stemwinder*, by *John Waite* and *Chris Ford*, a book that is also out-of-print. This work is the definitive book on the history of the ET&WNC Railroad including a listing of all of its locomotives and rolling stock. We have a copy in our library, and at least one more in the museum that we have relied heavily on for photographs of many of the buildings that were important to the narrow-gauge railroad. This book has been the primary source from which I have been able to create models of these structures, particularly buildings that have been destroyed many years ago to populate our 1925-themed model railroad. Unfortunately, the technology used for the printing of this book predated digital printing and to print new editions would have to be done from scratch and would be very expensive. It is, therefore, not going to happen in the near future.

<u>Around the Carter Railroad Museum</u>: As is our tradition, the lockbox code on the outside door containing the entrance keys to the museum has had its **code changed on 31 January**. All members who are currently paid up for 2023 have been given the code. No member is to provide this code to any other member.

Lots of activities are still taking place including the continued upgrades to both club, museum-owned, and private modules. Members are always welcome to come lend a hand, especially on Thursday afternoon-work nights.

- \**Ben Merritt* has 3-D printed the ET&WNC passenger coach *Azalea* in 3 different scales (contact Ben at his business website, *Merritt 3-D Designs and Printing*, for information and orders), and he has also 3-D printed the "Tweetsie" caboose #503. I have recently assembled, painted and decaled this caboose and you can see it on our layout or photos of it. It is a well-designed replica of the prototype and a welcome addition to our rollingstock. As with most custom kits you have to supply couplers and trucks.
- \*The MEMRR HO-Scale Layout has work continuing on the former "Don Ramey modules" with a timbering operation and logging on the mountain becoming the theme. Some private owners are also adding more details to their modules.
- \**N-Scale Layout* work continues to center on rockface upgrades and the replacement of aged lichen "vegetation" with fresh-looking form "vegetation".
- \**G-Scale Layout* will soon have its 4 aging turnouts replaced to improve the performance of both locomotives and rollingstock. One new steam locomotive has been purchased to replace some of the aging fleet of engines.
- **\*"Tweetsie" Layout** has had no additional work done on scenery, but the next section to receive such cosmetic attention will be the Johnson City engine facility area with ballasting of tracks, and yard detailing. As mentioned above, the #503 caboose is now ready for service.
- \*Library work on cataloging non-hardbound volumes will be the next task for the library staff.
- \*Children's Playroom has had no additional items placed into service, but remains active under the watchful eye of our Station Master, *Amy Merritt*, and with the outstanding help of our student workers.


### MEMRR Layout Update: Article and photographs by Logan Heaton

New utility poles are popping up across the layout following the main line. Now we did have poles up before following the outside line but not everywhere so now all the modules will be connected by these utility poles. The poles have also been moved from the outside to the inside main line which helps keep them out of the way especially in case of derailment so crews don't have to work around the poles to rerail any locomotives or rolling stock. Nothing has been decided yet if the poles will be connected by wire like the real thing, so we shall see in time.

The ash chute has been completed and now in place on the layout!! Tucked just behind the chutes where the magnetic ore would be loaded into the hopper cars the new ash chute has been fully assembled and weathered to be put in place already with a load to be hauled away by the next train to take away. This adds that much more to the mines to get the facility as close as possible to what it was back in its heyday as we continue to research the route of our current layout setup.

A new piece of rolling stock is being worked on for our ET&WNC roster. With many of our larger projects completed with the space we currently have, Dr. Fred Alsop has begun work on ET&WNC caboose #503. This kit is made by our friends at <u>Merritt 3D Designs & Printing</u> and like many of their products this one is also very well made with plenty of detail and will make an incredible addition to the layout once completed. Caboose #503 is certainly a unique one being the only caboose in the ET&WNC roster that did not have a cupola for the brakeman and conductor to see above the train so crews would have to watch from the windows or out on the platform. Dr. Alsop has already begun work by installing the grab irons on the caboose after drilling out the holes to install them along with preparing the chassis for the body. Again we would like to thank our friends at <u>Merritt 3D Designs & Printing</u> for this incredible piece and to keep up the good work on their products as we continue to follow the progress on this newest addition to the railroad.



### **Tweetsie Layout Update**: Article and photographs by Logan Heaton


Things have progressed incredibly on ET&WNC caboose #305 with Dr. Alsop going into paint, weathering and final assembly. After the body was primed and painted weathering the model began showing a lot of miles on the old caboose such as faded and chipped away paint near the chassis with some added dirt. Even the steps and platforms showing some major foot traffic coming in and out from the carriage. With all that done, work on the trucks and couplers were installed along with final assembly and decals to finish it up. Hopefully this weekend we will get a preview of the latest addition to the ET&WNC in action so be sure to stay tuned for that. ### N Scale Layout Update: Article and photographs by Logan Heaton


If there is one thing any model railroader will tell you, no matter what scale you run, sometimes things don't work out like you hope. Case and point is over on the N scale layout where things seem to have been finishing up on the remodel of the hill until an issue was found with the current design. Although most of the locomotives and rail equipment goes past this area fine with no issue it was found that longer locomotives, passenger cars and freight cars were having difficulty getting through the area without coming off the rails. To fix this problem museum members Jim Gorny and Mike Tarter work on chipping away the plaster to make enough clearance for all equipment to pass by without any sort of issue. After a few passes with a Southern Railway PB unit and a passenger car it seems now there is more than enough clearance for our longer pieces of equipment to go through without derailments so now time to repaint and begin again on the details.




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

#### Fred invited Officer Reports.

Secretary's report- Secretary, Mike Tarter, reported that the minutes of the September meeting have been submitted for review/correction/publication in the October Coal Road newsletter. # **George L Carter Railroad Museum and MEMMR**

The many colorful multiple railroads of the Midwest are featured at the George L. Carter Railroad Museum, located in the Campus Center Building of East Tennessee State University. The region encompassing Chicago, Detroit, Louisville, Milwaukee and St. Louis was the true epicenter of American commerce between east and west during the 20<sup>th</sup> century. Literally dozens of railroads large and small provided service throughout Ohio, Indiana, Illinois, Kentucky and the upper midwestern states, all service as links to the chain.

Between passenger and freight operations, the railroad were crucially important in the era before widespread air travel and interstate highways. This was especially true during the 1<sup>st</sup> & 2<sup>nd</sup> World Wars. Whether it was perishables like produce and livestock or raw commodities such as coal and ore, everything from store goods to Studebakers came from this region. Since so many models of these trains remain popular, icons of streamlining and strength, it is planned to have excellent Midwestern representations in operation by volunteers on the museum's 24x44 foot HO scale layout. The Carter Railroad Museum is open on Saturdays from 10:00 AM to 3:00 PM, and includes model railroad layouts, a special child's activity room, and ongoing programs. There is no admission fee but donations are welcome for its upkeep. The museum is also seeking artifacts for display, including the newest addition dedicated to the long-defunct, but well-remembered 'Tweetsie' line, the East

In addition to the displays, there is also a growing research library, and an oral history archive being established as part of the museum's programs. Members of the George L. Carter Chapter of the National Railway Historical Society and the Mountain Empire Model Railroaders (MEMRR) club coordinate the exhibits. Membership opportunities are available to adults, and include special benefits and model railroading enjoyment.

The museum can be identified by a flashing railroad crossing signal at the back entrance to the Campus Center Building. Visitors should enter ETSU's campus from State of Franklin Road (at green light) onto Jack Vest Drive and continue east to North Dossett Drive (then left) to John Roberts Bell Drive at end, then right then left on Ross Drive(176) to end, adjacent to the flashing RR crossing sign.
